

Supervisor Heads Drive For '76 Olympic Games

I remember the Olympic Games that were held in Los Angeles in 1932.

Although I was only 12 years old, I still can recall the excitement. I sold newspapers outside the gates of the Coliseum, and at that time papers sold for 3 cents. My brother John and Allan were ushers and they had special uniforms.

On opening day someone to whom I had sold a paper gave me a ticket and I had the opportunity to watch the opening ceremonies. What a thrilling sight it was for nearly 100,000 people.

SOUTHWEST Los Angeles was really the host to the Olympic Games. The Olympic Village was in Baldwin Hills, and Normandie, Vermont, and Slauson avenues were used for the long foot races. The streets were blocked off and the police escorted the runners through the area. In fact, one of the races went as far south as Rosecrans, and the streets were lined with all the people who could not go to the Coliseum.

Last year, when I was president of the Coliseum Commission, I introduced the motion that started the drive to bring the 1976 Olympic Games to Los Angeles. That year will be the 200th Anniversary of our country — on July 4, 1776, the Declaration of Independence was signed.

I FEEL the millions of citizens who have come to California since 1932 and the millions born here since then should have the opportunity to see the Olympic Games. There is no other community in the world which has the fine facilities we have in Los Angeles — not only the Coliseum and Sports Arena, but the Olympic Auditorium, athletic fields at the various colleges and high schools, and the marinas for rowing and other sports.

The atmosphere here is international in flavor with many nations represented by the citizens who live here.

I am going to Mexico to attend the Olympic Games along with other officials to talk to members of the International Olympic Committee. By communicating with the key I.O.C. repre-

sentatives from the world, in Mexico City, I hope we can lay the groundwork for the International Committee to vote for Los Angeles for the 1976 Olympic Games.

THERE IS much prepara-

tion and you have to work years ahead for final victory.

I have already talked to Prince Tsuneyoshi Takita, an I.O.C. member from Japan, when he visited Culver

City, and I told him briefly about the advantages of Los Angeles.

I also had as my guests members of the Japanese Olympic Team and I showed them the Coliseum and Sports Arena and escorted

them through my office, where each received a small replica of the official County flag.

Many old timers of the Southwest will remember the great Olympic Games in

Los Angeles of 1932. I do not know of a more important worldwide activity that Los Angeles ever had than the Olympic Games, and I hope to have a part in repeating this great event in 1976.

New Bus Service Planned

The new Dominguez Hills State College will have a new bus service—via Compton and Lynwood—beginning Nov. 3.

Southern California Rapid Transit District directors approved the action Oct. 1 at their semi-monthly meeting. The service will be provided on RTD's Compton-Lynwood Line 114 which now terminates three miles from the college at Artesia Boulevard and Victoria Street.

The line will be extended south to serve both the college and the city of Carson, added Raymond W. Gareau, RTD manager of operations.

OPERATING on a Monday through Friday basis, every 60 minutes, the district's Line 114 will continue southerly from the college site to serve a large residential development in the city of Carson in the vicinity of Turmont Street and Central Avenue.

Beginning at Imperial Highway and Century Boulevard, the line will be routed along Imperial Highway, Long Beach Boulevard, Pine Avenue, Santa Fe Avenue, Compton Boulevard, Acacia Avenue, Alondra Boulevard, Wilmington Avenue, Caldwell Street, McKinley Avenue, Claude Street, Gardena Boulevard, Avalon Boulevard, Artesia Boulevard, Central Avenue, Victoria Street, Avalon Boulevard, 190th Street, and Central Avenue to Turmont Street. The line will loop at Turmont Street, Hillford Avenue, Kramer Drive, and Princetown Avenue.
