

## New Anti-Smog Rule

# Electric Power Industry Praised for Cooperation

Supervisor Burton W. Chace today lauded the "excellent cooperation between county government and the electric power industry" which paved the way to another breakthrough in the continuing battle against smog.

Chace's remarks came after the Board of Supervisors approved a new rule which requires use of low sulfur fuel oil by the industry whenever natural gas is not available.

The new law, known as Rule 62.2, prohibits burning of high sulfur fuel oil in electric power generating plants. This high sulfur oil has been recognized as a major source of pollution for at least 15 years.

"THE SPLENDID support of Southern California Edison Co. and the Los Angeles Department of Water and

Power in bringing this restriction about is commendable," Chace said.

"I had anticipated much debate on the issue when it was heard," he said. "However the proposal carried the full support of the power industry and this reflects their desires to help Los Angeles beat the smog problem."

"This county is far ahead of all cities and counties across the nation in enforcing laws and regulations which cut down on smog," Chace said. "While the problem has not been resolved, we are making great strides."

RULE 62.2 was recommended by the Air Pollution Control District to control fuel burning when natural gas was not available for the electrical power plants. A previously established regulation, Rule 62, requires the

use of natural gas when it is available.

"During the five months from Nov. 16 through April 14 each year, the availability of natural gas fuel in Southern California is curtailed and the industry has been using high sulfur fuel oil," Chace said.

LOW SULFUR oil is being made available from Indonesia and Alaska, and Edison and the Department of Water and Power will use this supply during this fall and winter, the Fourth District Supervisor said.

Other municipally operated steam power plants will be required to comply with the low sulfur rule.

"The use of low sulfur oil and natural gas will greatly reduce fallout and unsightly plumes from electrical power generating installations in the Los Angeles Basin," Chace said.

- DANISH APPLE CAKE**  
 6 B.C. McIntosh apples, peeled and thinly sliced  
 1 cup melted butter  
 1/2 cup sugar  
 1 teaspoon cinnamon  
 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg  
 2 cups fine dry bread crumbs  
 1 cup whipping cream.

Lightly saute apples in butter; stir in sugar, cinnamon, and nutmeg. Put alternate layers of apple mixture with crumbs in a loaf pan. Chill several hours; turn out on platter or tray. Whip cream until stiff; cover top and sides of dessert with cream.

Makes 6 to 8 servings.

## ECC Faculty Association To Oppose Watson Issue

Jim Norris, president of the El Camino College Faculty Association, today announced his organization has gone on record against Proposition 9, the Watson Tax Amendment, on the Nov. 5 ballot.

"Proposition 9 would cause untold havoc to the public schools in every community in California," Norris said. "Every city, county and special service district in the state would also be plunged into unimaginable economic confusion."

"The Watson Amendment is a cruel hoax in that it would harm the very class of taxpayer it is purported to help. Proposition 9 dras-

tically cuts property tax revenues, but the replacement tax revenues necessary to keep schools and local government services in operation would more than offset property tax savings to individual homeowners.

"Proposition 9 is a tax trap, which all thinking homeowners and renters should avoid by casting their votes in opposition on Nov. 5.

"In their own best interests, and to save California from educational, governmental and economic chaos, the ECCFA urges all California citizens to vote 'NO' on Proposition 9," Norris declared.

# Unwed Mothers Find Care, Understanding

(Editor's Note: This is the second in a series of articles about some of the agencies which receive help through the United Crusade. United Crusade currently is conducting its annual fund drive with a countywide goal of \$28.2 million. The Harbor Area goal is \$450,000.

The black mark of illegitimacy on the innocent child born out of wedlock has been erased by a more enlightened public opinion, but the shadow of disgrace still clings to the unwed mother, who is further tormented by the decision of whether to raise a fatherless child or release her infant for adoption.

This is the consensus of opinion among directors and case workers of the Salvation Army Booth Memorial Homes and Hospitals which operate three major centers in California. One of these is located in Los Angeles, and serves girls from throughout the county. The work of these centers is supported by United Crusade.

## VFW Post To Mark Halloween

Saturday is the annual Halloween costume dance at Post 3261 of the Veterans of Foreign Wars Memorial Hall, 1822 W. 162nd St., Gardena.

The dance, held annually by VFW Post 3261, is to raise funds for their two children's Christmas parties. One party is held for the retarded children of the Gardena Valley Retarded Children's School. The second party is for post and underprivileged children of our community.

The public is invited to join the post. A donation of \$2 per person may be paid at the door.

Last year, 83,469 days' care were provided unwed mothers and their babies by these California-based maternity homes, figures which clearly illustrate that elimination of the problem of illegitimacy is not just around the corner.

ALWAYS filled to capacity and with waiting lists for admittance, the Salvation Army maternity homes and hospitals draw no line in the acceptance of applicants.

There is no yardstick for determining who an unwed mother might be. She comes from environments both poor and well-to-do, from families too permissive or too punitive. She is pretty or plain, highly intelligent or below average. Who she may be is beside the point.

When the unwed mother is admitted to the Salvation Army maternity center, she is usually at least four months' pregnant and has explored all possible ways out of her problem. Her future child's father, her parents, or even her own stoicism have caused her to go it alone.

THIS IS where the Salvation Army emerges as her protector and confidante. The Salvation Army gives her assurance that her baby will be born in good health and to future security.

That the majority of unwed mothers today are in their mid and late teens has been established by current statistics released by the United States Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

To assist them in continuing their high school education is an important task which the Salvation Army undertakes. Homes are equipped with classrooms and accredited teachers are assigned. There are numerous projects in arts and handicrafts, and always well-stocked libraries; there are attractive living quarters and regular pre-natal health examinations.

THE SALVATION Army not only cares for in-residence mothers, but also gives out-patient care and provides live-in jobs for girls as mother's helpers in approved homes. It does not deal in adoption, but through staff caseworkers it makes referrals to establish-

ed adoption agencies. These caseworkers also provide legal counseling.

The Salvation Army has won recognition as a leader in the field of care for unwed mothers and their infants.
