northwest corner of Sepulveda and Hawthorne Boulevards. Planning Commissioners had recommended denial of the permit.

Spokesman for Great Lakes Properties, Inc., developers of the complex, said the corner gas station would feature an esthetic design and would deal in gas sales alone. All repair work, lube racks, and other noise-creating functions would be conducted inside the large main building of the shopping center.

The spokesman noted that the mammoth shopping complex, with four acres under roof, would be located on the most expensive lot of its kind in Southern California. The store will not be a discount house, he said.

COUNCILMEN also okayed a loan from the city to the Meadow Park Redevelopment Agency for completion of the urban renewal project. The city is obligated to pay one third of the net project cost for the project.

The first cash payment of \$250,000 is due now. The next payment, in the amount of \$150,000 is due in Aug. 1969. The balance of the total \$520,533 is due in Aug. 1970.

The city will finance the current \$250,000 payment by selling four adjoining lots to the agency for \$96,990 and by borrowing \$153,000 from United California Bank.

opposed by the moderate elements of his own party, or why so many Democrats helped in the campaign of Lt. Gov. Finch and are helping my campaign now."

Following his speech, one student asked Blatchford about a four-page brochure mailed to all voters in the district two weeks ago which quoted several newspapers on Anderson's connection with the Watts riots, the California Democratic Council, and questionable dealings while in office.

ANDERSON had said nothing publicly about the brochure, which was compiled by a Committee of Concerned Democrats, until the two candidates appeared together before the San Pedro Chamber of Commerce last Friday.

At that time Anderson objected to the brochure as "a smear tactic," and disputed the validity of one section, titled "Use of Public Office for Own Benefit."

"We didn't write that brochure," Blatchford answered the Harbor student, "Anderson did. He's responsible for what it says. All we can take credit for is the layout. "I didn't see the brochure myself until it was ready to be mailed. But I'll stand behind it 100 per cent, and I challenge my opponent to stand behind his accusations, or to stand behind his whole record, or even to stand up before the voters of this district and tell them what he thinks about anything."

Blatchford said he and Anderson had been invited to appear together nine times during the last month, and the San Pedro meeting was the only invitation Anderson had accepted.

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Sheriff to Put Torch To Obscene Materials

Sheriff Peter J. Pichess has announced that he will personally put the torch to the first load of the largest pornographic literature disposal in the history of the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department Friday at 10 a.m.

The obscene materials, collected over a period of five years by the Sheriff's Vice Bureau, have overflowed the evidence lockers containing them and no longer are of any value in any court proceedings.

Valued at an estimated \$1.5 million on the illegal market, the collection includes some 125,000 pornographic books and magazines, 1,500 movie reels, and approximately one ton of miscellaneous indecent printed matter. Several hundred artificial "sex devices" and numerous pieces of equipment used in the preparation of pornographic material will also be burned.
