

# Big Game for El Camino, Bakersfield

It's Big Game Week on the campuses of Bakersfield and El Camino. The two undefeated, untied teams meet Saturday night at El Camino and for the second year in a row the championship of the Metropolitan Conference will be on the line in this football "natural."

Both teams have other tough opponents to meet in

succeeding weeks, but the winner here will be the odds-on favorite to claim the title for 1968.

In last year's showdown battle at Bakersfield, the same two teams went into the game with 8-0 marks. Bakersfield emerged a 34-8 victor, handing the Warriors their 11th straight loss in the annual series.

The series favors Bakersfield, 14-6, with one tie. The last time El Camino topped Bakersfield was in 1956 by a 7-6 score.

Bakersfield and El Camino set up their important meeting by scoring their sixth wins of the campaign last week. Bakersfield whipped Cerritos, 22-12, before a

capacity homecoming throng at Bakersfield, while El Camino topped stubborn Valley, 27-12. In other Metro games, Long Beach stayed in the race by pounding Santa Monica, 35-13, and Pierce won its first game of the year by nipping Pasadena, 10-7.

In other games on Satur-

day night, Cerritos is host to Pierce, Long Beach travels to Pasadena, and Santa Monica is at Valley.

Long Beach's Dennis Dummit resumed the lead in the Metropolitan Conference passing race by setting a new school record of 348 yards in one game while tossing two for touchdowns.

In the same game, John Merino retained his lead in the scoring derby tallying twice to boost his season total to 60 points. Santa Monica's TDs came on short runs by Bob Elliott and Ken Boney.

El Camino met stiff resistance from Valley, which trailed only 14-12 before the Warriors scored 13 points

in the final quarter. QB Dan Heck scored one TD and passed to Tom Reynolds for another, Jeff Selditz (18-yard run) and Gerald Gaddie (58-yard pass from Tony Moore) accounted for Valley scores.

Lindsey James' 67-yard run highlighted the Bakersfield win over Cerritos, The

Falcons' Mike Hlavaca, a defensive specialist, stole a pass and raced 55 yards for a tally for the game's most spectacular play.

### Gary Loyd Is Honored

Rams defensive captain Eddie Meador, UCLA linebacker Mike Ballou and defensive end Gary Loyd of California Lutheran were selected by the Southern California Football Writers to receive Adohr Fariñs' "Player of the Week" awards at the group's meeting Monday.

Professional "Player of the Week" Meador played his consistently good defensive game, including two pass interceptions, although the Baltimore Colts overwhelmed the Rams 27-10.

On the university level, Ballou, a 6' 3" junior, was also voted lineman of the game in which the defense played a major role in the Bruins' 20-17 win over the Stanford Indians.

California Lutheran defensive end Gary Loyd of Torrance won honors for an outstanding performance that helped the Thousand Oaks college defeat Simon Frazer University of Vancouver, B.C., 39-17. The 210-pound senior blocked a punt which subsequently resulted in a touchdown, returned one kickoff 70 yards for a touchdown and made 12 unassisted tackles. Loyd also punted six times for an average of 54.3 yards, including one for 79 yards.

Meador, Ballou and Loyd each was presented with an engraved silver tray.

### Trio Eyes San Fernando Trot

Members of the highly-competitive trotting division at Hollywood Park will clash Saturday in the \$15,000 San Fernando Trot.

Three different horses have accounted for the first three features. This trio—Grandpa Jim, Earl Laird and Fresh Yankee—is expected to head the field for the San Fernando, along with Speedy Play, Lady B. Fast and Sir Faffee.

Earl Laird, winner of the Christopher Columbus Trot in impressive fashion, had his four race Hollypark win streak snapped in the recent Elks Trot. He was fourth in the one mile event behind Fresh Yankee.

One of harness racing's "Cinderella" horses, Earl Laird has rebounded from a serious injury sustained last year to become a leading contender for the American Trotting Classic, a race which he won in 1966.

Grandpa Jim, defending champion in the Classic, was a fast-closing third in the Elks Trot.

Fresh Yankee, winner of more than \$200,000 in her career, showed she could handle the boys when she scored a narrow but decisive victory over Speedy Play in the Elks Trot.

Sir Faffee, who posted a pair of sub-two minute clockings last year at Hollywood Park, earned a spot in the free-for-all class when he sped to a 1:59 win October 18, equalling the fastest time of the meeting.

### Bakersfield Sellout?

Reserved seat tickets for Saturday's El Camino College-Bakersfield football game are now on sale in the college bookstore.

The annual homecoming game for El Camino alumni will be preceded by the traditional parade beginnings at 7 p.m.

In addition to the reserved seat tickets, general admission tickets will go on sale at 6 p.m. the night of the game, but only 4,500 tickets will be available.

Reserved seats are \$2 and general admission tickets are \$1.50.

### Ed Meador Isn't Slowing Down

If, at 31, Ed Meador is slowing down, it is not evident by the statistics.

The veteran Ram free safety intercepted two passes in last Sunday's 27-10 loss at Baltimore to run his 1968 total to six in seven games and his career mark to 39—a club record.

Last season, Ed's best statistically, he intercepted eight.

As a team the Rams have 16 thefts, so at the season's halfway point they are right on schedule toward matching their 1967 performance of 32 which tied for the NFL lead.

The Ram secondary will get a chance to meet an old friend this Sunday when ex-Ram quarterback Bill Munson makes his first Coliseum appearance in a Detroit uniform. Kickoff time is 1:05 p.m. with both teams fighting for the lead of their respective divisions.


The Rams are 6-1 and tied for the top spot with Baltimore in the Coastal Division while Detroit's 3-3-1 record is good for first place in the Central group.

## 'Power' Accounts For West Victory

Redondo put up a good fight against West High for about three minutes Friday night. In the first offensive series of the game for the Warriors they were backed from their own 33 to the 27 where on fourth down Jim Parton ran a fake punt out to the 45 yard line for a stunning first down.

It was probably the turning point in the game as powerful West rolled to a 32-7 victory with four first half touchdowns for a 4-0 record.

The first TD was a beauty. Quarterback Coy Hall hit Gary Kendrick over the middle with a pass. Gary picked up a key block from opposite end Tom Aines for a run to the Redondo 5. Hall scored from the 4 on a roll-out.

Before the first quarter let out West went 80 yards for a second touchdown. Dean Owens sprinted 15 yards for the score.

Aines caught a 33 yard pass from Hall in the second quarter and Owens went another 25 yards for a 26-0 lead.

Gary Hulsev, who ran for 117 yards, galloped 8 for a third quarter score. Redondo got on the scoreboard in the fourth quarter.

WEST's opponent next Friday is Mira Costa (3-1) which posted a 31-13 win over Inglewood. Most of the damage came in the second and third quarters when the Mustangs collected four TDs.

Pat Moore threw three

touchdown passes to give Costa a 3-1 record.
