## Kanine Korner

Increasing popularity of purebred pet dogs, especially Poodles, has brought about a corresponding boom in the canine beauty business.

Most professional groomers are skilled and conscientious. A few, however, are not and no license requirements exist as they do for human beauticians.

Your dog's groomer should be chosen with the same care you'd select your own barber shop or beauty salon. An incompetent job may temporarily ruin your pet's appearance. Careless treatment can have more serious results.

As with any other type of service, satisfied customers are the best recommendation. Ask advice of acquaintances or kennel owners who have the same breed as yours.

**BUT IF** you go "cold" to a groomer, first take a careful look at his shop. It doesn't have to be fancy but it should be clean and well equipped. Grooming tables should be sturdy and of adequate size. Clippers, brushes, combs, and other tools should be in good condition.

There should be separate stalls or cages available and used for each waiting dog. Putting two or more dogs together saves space and accommodates extra customers but the most placid pet may react badly to other strange dogs.

Observe the groomer going about his job. Make sure he cleans the equipment between jobs and never leaves a dog alone or leashed to a high grooming table. Even if the leash is fastened short there may be enough leeway for the dog to wiggle his legs off the table and choke.

**THE GROOMER'S** tone of voice and his general manner with dogs indicates how he'll treat them when no one is watching him.

Become familiar with the proper grooming of your particular dog's breed. You may not necessarily want your pet to look ready to step into a show ring but you do want him an attractive representative of his breed.

Poor workmanship is certainly reason enough to seek out another grooming establishment. Even better reasons, however, are your dog's coming home from a grooming session with cuts or clipper burn. Be suspicious too, if he acts frightened or lethargic, as though he'd been tranquilized to keep him quiet.

Finding a good professional groomer is well worth the time and effort. He'll turn out your pet like a canine fashion model and keep him tail-wagging happy during the process. And that's for dog-gone sure!

a pet shop window: "If you must go to the dogs, stop here first..." The unique coloration blends perfectly with the background of marsh vegetation. The Chesapeake Bay Retriever is one of the most intelligent and resourceful of dogs. His fantastic memory makes it possible for a trained member of this breed to mark the fall of two or more ducks at a time and bring them in one at a time. ## Santa Claus Special To Sail on Nov. 21

The "1968 Santa Claus Special", a fast United States cargo ship, will sail from Oakland Nov. 21 and will carry parcels to ports in Vietnam in sufficient time for delivery before Christmas.

According to William L. Rogers, president of the Board of Directors of the USO-Los Angeles Area, fourth class parcels must be mailed by Nov. 9. Endorse on the outside "Santa Claus Special" above the address and below the space where the stamps are placed.

The Armed Forces, in coordination with the Post Office Department, developed the plan to send packages at a substantial saving to the general public. The ship will have ports of call at Da Nang, Cam Ranh Bay, and Saigon.

Rogers also said packages for servicemen mailed by Nov. 9, will be delivered before the holidays. Use of fourth class mail saves money. Properly endorsed with the "Santa Claus Special,"

the packages are assured delivery by Dec. 25.

Packages to "Any Serviceman" distributed through USO should be mailed to Director, USO Club. Addresses of overseas USO Clubs may be obtained by writing to USO, 111 W. 5th St., Los Angeles 90013.
