Trustees Continue Photo Plan

The elementary school picture program, a \$40,000 commitment a year ago, will be repeated by the Torrance Unified School District during the 1968-69.

The Board of Education voted 4-0 Monday night to retain Thompson Photography, Inc., for the project. Recommendations for improving the individual souvenir color photograph program will be prepared by a team consisting of a principal and members of the faculty.

A report from the photographer indicated 88 per cent sales was achieved last year, exceeding a normal situation of 75 per cent. The reason given for the high percentage was that the district has not had pictures for many years. Board member Bert Lynn, who opposed the picture taking business last year because of the amount of costs involved, abstained from voting when the item was considered again.



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
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
