Banning Folklore

THE LIBRARY at Banning Mansion was one of the most complete, during the lifetime of Phineas Banning, than possibly any other private home library in the harbor area. The more we read the old books there, the more grateful we are to be the curator in charge. From these books, magazines, newspapers and reports we learn much about the past, and much more about Phineas Banning's contemporaries by probing through the leaves of these historical gems, than from most any source.

FOR INSTANCE, we found an old diary giving dates and names of clipper ships and brigs that came to the Wilmington-San Pedro docks from ports throughout the world, and we found other pertinent facts which were of value to Phineas Banning, and now of utmost importance to us and to this column. In future articles we shall quote more and more from this library than from any other source.

THE BRILLIANT scholar, Dr. Robert M. Bersi, author of the weekly "College Report" column featured in this newspaper, typifies what we mean by an original researcher. If you do not read him, please do, otherwise you are missing out on one of the most interesting and informative reports on education that this writer has ever read. In one of his columns Mr. Bersi reported on the early 19th century campus rallies of students who march against the "Establishment." Research shows that every generation believed they were living at a very crucial and urgent time in human history. We of this generation are positive that this is indeed the most fateful of all, with the Vietnam mess, population explosion, youth rebellion, drug peddling, homicides and nationwide civil disorders; the credibility gap of high public officials, of conformity and non-conformity, and so forth. History runs in cycles. Now read what Harper's Weekly, Oct. 1858 issue, found in the Banning Library, says about current affairs as it was in those days.

"IT IS A gloomy moment in history. Not in the lifetime of most of us has there been so much grave and deep apprehension. Never has the future seemed so incalculable than at this present time. The political cauldron seethes and bubbles with uncertainty. Russia hangs, as usual, like an ugly cloud-dark and silent upon the horizon of Europe and Asia. It is a solemn moment, and of our trouble, no man can see the end."

THE ABOVE was an editorial written 110 years ago. This voice from the past should help to remind us that the bleak and unhappy conditions of our world today are hardly something new under the sun. And now let us go back to the year 394 B.C. when Socrates was shouting to the world this admonition: "The children now love luxury. They show disrespect to elders and love chatter in place of exercise. Children are tyrants . . . they contradict their parents, chatter and show-off before company, gobble up dainties at the table, and tyrannize over their teachers."

Barrier Project Slated

County Supervisors have approved plans and specifications for another unit of the Dominguez Gap sea barrier project in the Wilmington area and issued a call for bids, Supervisor Burton W. Chace said today.

Estimated cost of the unit is placed at about \$400,000.

Contractors' offers will be opened Dec. 20 in the offices of the County Flood Control District. Award of the contract by the Supervisors is expected about 10 days later, Chace said.

The job calls for installation of about two and one-half miles of water supply pipeline and approximately one mile of disposal line.

The supply line will provide water for recharge wells to help maintain a barrier against further sea water encroachment into fresh supplies, Chace said. Purpose of the disposal line is to remove dirty water when wells are flushed.

Site of the work lies generally within the boundaries of Pacific Coast Highway on the north, the Harbor Freeway on the west, "B" Street on the south, and Alameda Street on the east.

Body of Engineer Found

The wife of a Torrance engineer discovered her husband's body early Monday morning inside the family car, parked in their garage. The car engine was still running.

Dead of apparent carbon monoxide poisoning was George D. Darragh Jr., 44, of 18347 Van Ness Ave. Police listed the death as suicide.

Darragh's wife Irene told police she had last seen her husband alive the night before. He had been watching television when she retired.

Mrs. Darragh said her husband had been depressed lately.
