ALSO FOR the first time, too, the clothes being shown will be made by the girls modeling them. The garments were judged yesterday by Joanne Stark of Jeannes Fabrics, Karen Terry of the May

Co., and Elinor Shanellec of Elena's Fabrics. In a possible 100 points, 40 were for workmanship, 20 for poise and how it fits, 20 for originality, 10 for accessories and color co-ordination, and 10 for how modeled.

There are five categories of garments: school wear, sports wear, date wear, wool garments, and formal wear. From the 50 girls entered, 25 semi-finalists were picked. These girls will model Thursday in an assembly at South. From the 25 semi-finalists, five finalists were picked. Ten girls were given honorable mention for workmanship.

LAST TUESDAY, Girls' League installation of new officers was held at an assembly. The five Girls of the Month were publicly announced for the first time. Girls' League President Paula Keener was named Girl of September for her organization of the League, her representation at Girls' State, and her work on the school newspaper.

Celia Wei-lo, the first girl presented with the Southern California Education Council's math and science award, was picked for October.

For November, the award went to the chairman of Homecoming '68, Lyn Thomas.

"Many small shops were paying just a few dollars less than much larger operations and this is not fair," Chace said.

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
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
