job. In addition to feeding them and cleaning their cages, the girls must give the guinea pigs vitamin C daily and bathe them twice a week. Baths take place in the bathroom sink and are followed by a session with the hair dryer to prevent pneumonia.

THE GUINEA pigs eat grass, weeds, dandelions, vegetables, and rabbit pellets. They do not eat meat and do not drink milk. Pam and Julie pointed out.

Currently, the girls are working out plans for converting the Horwich's old dog house into a dormitory for girl guinea pigs. (Males must have individual cages, the pair report, because they tend to fight.)

In addition to selling guinea pigs, the girls make money by washing, brushing, grooming and boarding other people's pigs. Their business cards read "Prince Pig" Covey Salon. Are they making money?

ACCORDING to the girls, there's an old saying in covey circles: "You can never get rich off guinea pigs."

However, they are more optimistic about their genetic research than they are about their financial future. Their experience has borne out what breeders have known for years: Peruvians are the hardest strain to breed.

The girls want to know why. For this year's science fair project, they intend to probe that question.

As for other future plans, there is one that takes definite precedence. Butterbrick, the offspring of Butterbrock and Buttercup, and their very first baby pig, celebrates her first birthday this month. Plans call for stashing away several heads of lettuce and inviting all 30 pigs to a big birthday bash.

City Gets State Grant For Park

Gov. Ronald Reagan announced \$7,247,611 has been approved and placed in his budget, from 1964 State Park Bond Act funds, for appropriations to 53 city and county park projects throughout the state.

Included in the 53 projects from 23 counties in the 1969-70 budget are 5,153 acres of land for acquisition and 3,819 acres for development.

The Torrance regional park will be granted \$39,414 for the acquisition of one acre.

There will be another open house next Sunday from 5 to 8 p.m. at the headquarters.

Solomon has announced the appointment of three community leaders to key positions in his campaign for mayor. They are: Campaign Chairman James Hutchinson; Campaign Treasurer Robert Dunn; and Finance Chairman Allan Crowne.

Hutchinson, a retired Redondo Beach businessman, brings to his post a long involvement in

the city's affairs, the most recent being the YMCA fund drive and the presentation of toys to needy children in Mexico.

Dunn, a cost management executive at North American Rockwell, has served as a Redondo Beach Parks and Recreation Commissioner, Commander of the Redondo Beach American Legion Post and is active in the Elks and Youth Baseball Council.

Crowne, a stockbroker at E. F. Hutton and Co., was a Phi Beta Kappa at UCLA and has been involved in many civic and professional activities.

Solomon has called for the creation of a Mayor's Advisory Council.

Solomon said, "The purpose of the council would be to keep the mayor constantly informed of the feelings of the people of Redondo Beach. The members would consist of representatives from the many youth, senior citizen, religious, business, civic, and consumer organizations.

Attorney, City Agree On Fees

City officials have reached a "compromise" agreement with attorney Walter N. Anderson regarding his fee for handling the city's case against suspended city engineer Walter M. Nollac. Nollac is being tried before the Civil Service Commission for alleged misconduct and incompetency.

Anderson has agreed to charge \$35 per hour for preparatory work in the case and \$40 per hour for actual trial time before the commission. These fees would be retroactive to Feb. 1.


