



Hadassah To Observe Purim with Luncheon

Celebrating the holiday of Purim, when Queen Esther saved the children of Israel from destruction at the hand of Haman, the South Bay Chapter of Hadassah will serve a luncheon in the social room of Western Federal Savings, Hawthorne at Carson in Torrance, on Tuesday, March 4, at noon.

A program of Hebrew melodies will be sung by Mark Newman, grandson of Mrs. Nan Sattou, a charter member of the chapter. He will accompany himself on the guitar. Games will follow the musical program.

Proceeds from the affair will go to the Hadassah Hospital, hub of the Hadassah-Hebrew University Medical Center on the outskirts of Jerusalem. More than 17,000 patients receive treatment annually. To do this the hospital maintains 600 beds, 28 departments, 31 institutes and laboratories, and

has a pharmacy which fills 270,000 prescriptions a year. Its facilities are open to Arab and Jew alike.
