BREED OF THE WEEK — Brussels Griffon . . . The Brussels Griffon's upturned, bewiskered little face gives him a monkeyish, almost human expression. Terrier-like in build, the Griffon is also gifted with the alert intelligence and high spirited good humor, definitely Terrier attributes.

Typical specimens of this breed are characterized by a smart strutting carriage and short, thick set bodies. The Griffon is not of ancient lineage. The breed in its present form probably did not exist much before the 1880s. It took a combination of four older breeds to produce the 20th Century Brussels Griffon.

THESE FOUR breeds included — the German Affenpinscher, a common Belgian street dog (known as the Stable Griffon), the pug, and the Toy Spaniel. The Griffon's short pushed-in nose, large circular eyes and domed skull are most likely conceived from the Pug and the Toy Spaniel.

The breed's cocky intelligence, hardness and gameness make him one of the most attractive of the toy breeds. The Brussels Griffon tips the scales at about eight pounds and in height eight inches.
