Annual Girl Scout Cookie Sale Opens Today

Hundreds of girls, ages 7-17 years, will be celebrating Girl Scout Week, in a very special way — selling Girl Scout Cookies.

From today through March 16, Girl Scouts will use the new technique of advance order-taking, a departure from their traditional direct sale approach. In this way, they hope to give all buyers the advantage of any quantity and variety they desire.

Delivery of the cookies is slated for April 18-28. Five varieties are offered to the customers.

In purchasing these cookies, homemakers will not only purchase good food, they are investing in the girls of this community. Development of responsible, courteous attitudes, as well as provision for camperships for underprivileged girls who could not attend camp, and improvement and maintenance of Girl Scout camps, all of these are direct results of the cookie sale.

This year for the first time, gourmet recipes using the different kind of cookies are listed for the homemaker.

SAVANNAH TOFFEE TORTE

- 1 box, Savannah cookies, 1 cup powdered sugar rolled
- 1 1/2 squares chocolate
- 1/2 c. chopped nuts 3 eggs, separated
- 1/4 lb. oleo or butter pinch of salt

Cream butter, sugar. Add beaten egg yolks. Melt chocolate. Add to above with salt. Fold in stiff egg whites. Sprinkle 1/2 cookie crumbs and nuts on bottom of greased, 8"x8"x1" pan. Pour mixture over. Sprinkle other half on top. Refrigerate 12 hours before serving.

CHOCOLATE ICE BOX ROLL

- 1 cup heavy cream 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
- 1/4 cup sugar dash of salt
- 1/2 cup instant sweet cocoa 12 Scot-Teas mix

Whip cream, cocoa mix (or cocoa and sugar), salt and vanilla until thick. Spread some of the mixture on each cookie. Place them together in a stack or roll. Put on platter or in refrigerator dish. Frost outside of stack or roll with remaining chocolate cream. Leave in refrigerator eight hours or overnight. Cut in diagonal slices about 1 inch thick.
