

Dill's Constituents Object To Tax Withholding Plan

A survey taken by Sen. Ralph C. Dills (D-San Pedro) of 90,000 households in his 32nd Senatorial District indicates those polled do not favor an advance deduction of state income taxes from their paychecks. He said 44.6 per cent favored withholding, while 51 per cent were opposed, and 4.2 per cent had no preference. A bill now before the Legislature calling for withholding is opposed, as before, by the governor. Unless he changes his mind, Capitol observers say the measures do not have much chance of becoming law, Dills said.

48 per cent of those polled thought the state government should provide more funds for elementary, high schools, and junior colleges, compared with 44.3 per cent who said "no." At the same time, 61.4 per cent said they were "generally dissatisfied with the University of California and the state colleges." Only 32.6 per cent voiced opinion in the affirmative. Dills said that those responding voted negatively by 52.2 per cent on the subject of parents of college and university students receiving a tax credit on their state income, while 42.9 per cent favored such a move. In view of possible legislation which would make the posses-

sion and use of marijuana legal, the Senator received a whopping 85.9 per cent "no" in response to whether or not this should become law. Only 11.8 per cent favored the proposed measure. **IN ATTACKING** the problem of drug and narcotic use by youth, 49.7 per cent recommended stricter laws, 29.7 per cent thought it could be accomplished by more education, and 14.2 called for the combined methods. On the question of sufficient recreational facilities (parks, beaches, tennis courts, golf courses), in the 32nd Senatorial District, 50.5 per cent thought there were sufficient facilities, and 45.4 per cent disagreed.
