5,000 to Graduate in Ceremonies This Week

Exercises Set Wednesday at High Schools

Almost 5,000 students — 4,965 to be exact — will graduate from Torrance schools this month, according to Dr. J. H. Hull, superintendent of schools. This represents a decrease of 15 students from last year and the first decrease in the number of graduates in the district's history.

Biggest decrease is in the elementary school level where 2,680 eighth graders will receive diplomas, 32 less than a year ago. Although more high school seniors are graduating this June, less adults are receiving night school diplomas.

Receiving high school diplomas are 2,098 students, 35 more than last year. Only 187 persons will graduate from adult school, however, as compared with 205 a year ago.

COMMENCEMENT exercises will take place Monday, Wednesday, and Thursday. Columbia School and the Torrance Adult Evening High School will hold ceremonies Monday. High school graduations will be Wednesday at 8 p.m., and elementary graduations Thursday evening.

Handing out diplomas will be school board members, former board members, district administrators, and a retired industrialist.

All ceremonies will take place at the home school with the following exceptions: Carr exercises will be held at El Camino College, Fern-Greenwood at Torrance High School auditorium, Madrona at Torrance Recreation Center, Seaside at South High School cafeteria, Victor at West High School gymnasium, Newton at South High School gymnasium, Adams at Lomita Park gymnasium, Hickory at El Camino College auditorium, Wood at Torrance High School auditorium, Riviera at South High

School cafeteria and Torrance High School at El Camino College.

DIPLOMAS will be presented as follows:

Monday: Columbia, 7:30 p.m., Dr. Louis Kaplan, assistant.

Library Budget Slashed

Budget for the new Civic Center Library, slated to open in May, 1970, was slashed by more than 10 per cent Wednesday at the first budget hearing session.

Councilmen voted 6-1 to give City Librarian Russell West \$45,000 with which to open the proposed library. The management staff had asked for roughly \$52,000.

Sole dissenting vote was cast by Councilman William J. Uerkwitz.

MAYOR Albert Isen questioned the need to hire 29 new employees to staff the new library, only to be told by West that 29 people would be the minimum number needed to carry on operations.

West said the new library would be 40 times the size of any of the existing branch libraries in Torrance, adding that he hoped to keep the new library open a challenging 70 hours per week. He said the library would open with 75,000 volumes and grow rapidly during the first year. Total capacity would be 100,000.

Five-Month Totals Top \$13.7 Million

Building activity in the City of Torrance continues at an upward pace.

During the month of May, total valuation of proposed build-

ings for which permits were issued stood at \$4,530,245. That figure for May, 1968, was \$1,572,255.

Total building valuation from January through May, 1969, came to \$19,590,990. For the same period in 1968, the figure was \$13,713,290.

PERMITS for 71 single family dwellings were issued at a total valuation of \$1,851,675. For May, 1968, only 18 new dwellings at a total cost of \$470,455 were applied for.

May, 1969, was also ahead in terms of new apartment house permits. Some 90 new units will be built at a cost of \$874,790. In May, 1968, 60 units were issued permits at a construction cost of \$585,650.

Six permits for new commercial buildings were granted, at a total valuation of \$239,925. Five such permits were granted in May, 1968, at a total valuation of \$32,880.

NOTEWORTHY permits granted last month include a

permit for a 68-home development on the 19700 blocks of Linda, Mildred, and Redbeam Avenues, Applicant for the \$1,773,395 project was R. A. Watt Co. (Boise-Cascade).

Coldwell Banker and Co. was granted a permit to build a \$71,585 commercial building at 21825 Hawthorne Blvd. and Goodyear Service Store was granted permission to build a \$120,000 store at 21770 Hawthorne Blvd.

G. L. Schuler was issued a permit to build two apartment houses at 3656 Garnet Ave. The 71-unit apartment will cost \$667,590 and the smaller 19-unit apartment will cost \$207,200.

He will discuss the topic, "Education in America, the Challenge."

Following the playing of the processional by the Torrance High School Concert Band, under the direction of John Spence, Rev. Charles E. Phelps, pastor of the Community Baptist Church, will deliver the invocation.

MELTON NYGREN will lead the flag salute and Dr. J. H. Hull, superintendent of schools, will introduce the keynote speaker.

The Class of '69 will be presented by Raymond Collins, adult education principal, and accepted by Dr. Richard D. Guengerich, assistant superintendent, secondary education.

Diplomas will be presented by Board of Education members Mrs. Kenneth Watts, Burton Belzer, Stanley Dunn, Bert Lynn, and Dr. Griffith. Preceding the recessional, Rev. Phelps will deliver the benediction.
