Probation Department Opens Unit in Lomita

A county Probation Department offering special rehabilitation services to both adult and juvenile offenders has opened new offices at 2049 Pacific Coast Hwy., Lomita.

Subsidized by the state, the Youthful Offender Program provides intensive supervision for juveniles and adults who otherwise might be sent to state institutions. Ron Underwood, supervising deputy probation officer, is in charge of the new unit.

The new location is a sub-office of the Probation Department's Harbor area office, headed by Director Sidney Wachs, at 3221 Torrance Blvd.

IN THE planning stage now, services will include group and family counseling, community work programs for neighborhood improvement, employment opportunities and special training designed to develop the probationers' responsibility.

"We will be working more with community resources than before in the YOP program — the schools, the state employment offices and with local psychiatric and medical facilities," Wachs said. "We will be assisted by three community workers in this endeavor," he added.

Communities served by the new suboffice include Palos Verdes Peninsula, Lomita, Harbor City, Wilmington, and San Pedro. The YOP office also serves Torrance, Redondo Beach, Hermosa Beach, Manhattan Beach, Carson, and a portion of Los Angeles.

ALSO AT the Lomita suboffice is an additional juvenile unit which handles a large portion of the regular juvenile probation work in this area. This unit is under the supervision of supervising deputy probation officer Doris Harris, who is assisted by eight deputy probation officers in the investigation, supervision, and placement of juvenile offenders.

Underwood supervises six deputy probation officers who handle the unit's maximum of 300 cases. Three officers handle approximately 45 juvenile cases each, while the other three work with a similar number of adult offenders. This, compared with the 75 juvenile and 175 adult cases handled by probation officers in regular units of the department, makes it possible to give each case the intensive attention such difficult cases require.

Director for "See How They Run" is Larry J. Hayter and the producer is Tom Morton.

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
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
