# Civic Center Library Construction Started

## New Facility A Year Away

Construction of Torrance's new \$1.5 million central library was begun Wednesday afternoon on the civic center as city officials and civic leaders joined in groundbreaking ceremonies for the structure.

The new facility, to become the hub of the city's new independent library system, will be located on the Torrance Boulevard frontage of the civic center adjacent to the city plunge.

When completed a year from now, the building will contain about 4,000 square feet and will house about 212 volumes for the city's library users.

Other facilities will include a meeting room which will seat more than 150 persons, audio visual facilities, films, art reproductions, and a center for graphic arts.

Through the cooperation with the Lions Club, whose ongoing project is to provide aid for the sightless, the library will include a section equipped with special typewriters books Braille volumes, audio equipment, and other special aids to the blind.

Opening of the library is being scheduled for July 1, 1970.

## Botanic Garden Founder Retires

Frances Young, founder of the South Coast Botanic Garden Foundation, is retiring as the foundation's first and only president.

After 10 years of full time volunteer service as "First Lady" of the South Coast Botanic Garden, Mrs. Young is now president emerita of the garden's foundation.

IN 1958, Mrs. Young took first steps toward the creation of the garden by enlisting the aid of friends, citizen groups, and garden clubs. Petitions were circulated requesting the county board of supervisors to set aside part of the land fill area of Rolling Hills for the proposed garden.

Her tireless efforts were rewarded in 1960 with the establishment of the garden.

THE 87-ACRE facility has become the rooting grounds for thousands of plants, collected under Mrs. Young's leadership. The garden also features a clubhouse building, in which horticulture lectures are given. A basic research library is currently being collected.

The garden, which was a trash heap ten years ago, now welcomes thousands of visitors each year. Lawns, wooded hillsides, and the beginning of a lake and stream now cover the acreage formerly used as a dump.

MRS. YOUNG and her husband came to California in 1920. Her first project in Los Angeles was the building of Bethany Baptist Church at 104th and San Pedro Streets. The site was considered "way out in the country" in those days.

In 1935, the Youngs moved to Hermosa Beach, where they now make their home. Mrs. Young has been responsible for many civic beautification and landscaping projects in the South Bay area.

## Engineer Cited For Service

At the age of 71, Dexter Pullen is the only Los Angeles city employe ever to be permitted to work two years beyond the mandatory retirement age of 70.

Although he was formally retired recently by the Board of Public Works, he will keep on working for three more months because the Bureau of Engineering finds him indispensable.

Pullen, who lives in Lomita with his wife Dorothy, was presented with a Citation for Service at retirement ceremonies.

Pullen has a degree in architectural engineering from UCLA, where he was a star athlete.

## REFORM Beverly Named To Tax Group

Beverly, who is chairman of the Assembly Committee on Finance and Insurance, also serves on the Assembly Judiciary and Local Government Committees and is a member of the Constitutional Revision Commission and the Economic Conversion Committee.
