Junk Cars Create New Problem Here

Automobiles are a necessity of our present-day society — especially in spread-out Los Angeles County.

Yet they create some of the greatest problems our county has.

Air pollution has to be labeled the number one automobile problem. Yet another type of pollution is second.

The problem is junk cars. As of 1967, there were 17 1/2 million junk cars in the United States. It is estimated eight million will be added each year by 1975.

SINCE A typical scrap car weighs 3,340 pounds, this means there are about 57 billion pounds of junk cars in the United States.

And another 27 billion pounds each year by 1975.

A typical scrap car may be broken down into the body, 1-100 pounds; engine and transmission, \$50; frame, suspension, axles and drive shaft, 900 pounds; combustibles and

debris, 400 pounds; and glass and miscellaneous, 90 pounds. The most productive way to solve the problem of billions of pounds of junk cars would be to scrap them back into the steel production process.

HOWEVER, changing technology of steel production, nationally and worldwide, and the large numbers and pounds of vehicles involved, has reduced the current demand in the steel industry for junked automobiles.

All these cars are being stored in wrecking yards. And they will continue to pile there unless we find a way of getting rid of them.

We can improve the appearance of the wrecking yard so they do not affront the public.

Stronger rules are in effect in Los Angeles County, at my request, to govern wrecking yards.

THEY NEED to be improved and can be done so through landscaping and fencing to promote beautification and safety.

I urge all wrecking yards to start scenic improvement measures even beyond those required by our new county ordinance.

There are still too many wrecking yards where portions of wrecked automobiles and trucks front on public roads or public right-of-way.

But the wrecking yard problem will never be solved as long as there are more and more cars being stacked into the yards.

What we need is an orderly program for doing away with the cars when they no longer are of use.

THE BEST way is to scrap the material and let it be used again.

I often have said the industry which creates a problem should be the industry to solve it.

As I believe the auto industry should solve our problems of air pollution by developing and installing proper smog control devices, I believe it should take responsibility for junk cars.

The auto industry, which uses billions of tons of materials each year, should buy scrap metal from wrecked cars to make new cars.

First Aid Class Set For July 1

To help local residents deal more effectively with minor first aid problems that arise during the summer months, Red Cross will offer a free standard first aid course beginning July 1.

The 10-hour course, which will be taught by a certified Red Cross instructor, will include instruction in wound care, bleeding control, artificial respiration, poison care, bone and joint injury care, burn care, care of minor injuries, and transportation of the injured, according to Mrs. C. C. Callahan, safety programs chairman for the San Pedro-Palos Verdes Red Cross Branch.

The class will be held at the Red Cross Service Center, 1399 W. First St., San Pedro, Tuesdays from 7 to 9:30 p.m., Mrs. Callahan said. Enrollment may be made by calling Red Cross.



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
