## Words of Wisdom

Don't let short height keep you from dreaming of a career in basketball. L.A. Stars player Dick Halway told a group of eighth-grade athletes this week.

Halway, who measured five-feet-four inches and tipped the scales at 120 pounds when he graduated from high school, was one of 15 adults who described their professions at a career day program for elementary school students.

Attending the four-hour event at Magruder Elementary School were youngsters from Madison, Perry, Edison and Yukon Elementary Schools.

Because he was short, Halway told the youngsters, he specialized in cross-country and tennis in high school—but managed to get in half an hour's daily practice in basketball on his own time.

When growth came in college, he was ready to show his stuff, the 33-year old stocky blonde athlete recalled.

"Sandy Koufax never played baseball till he got out of school," he said. "He was a basketball star."

As for the workaday details of a career in sports, Halway told the youngsters, professional players usually start out earning \$10,000 to \$12,000 per season. Baseball players have a pension fund, he said, but basketball players do not.

Drawbacks to a sports career, according to the basketball player, include mental and physical strain players undergo.

"The best advice I can give you," he commented, "is to get good grades. You'll need them to get into a good university; and that's where they're scouting for All-Americans."

## Rain Helped Condition Hollypark Race Track

Hollywood Park's main track is open for training for thoroughbreds preparing for the 1969 season.

Early use of the one-mile oval by the more than 700 thoroughbreds already on hand for the 75-day season, according to John Maluvius, is due largely to the surprisingly strong helping hand received from "Mother Nature" during a two-month reconstruction period.

"We had hoped to have the track ready by March 15," Maluvius explained, "but because of the great amount of moisture received during late January and early February, the track shaped up much faster than expected and came to hand in excellent order. This has enabled us to open it nearly a week ahead of schedule."

Maluvius pointed out the unusually heavy amount of rainfall (approximately 28 inches) received this year nearly washed out plans for the scheduled opening.

"Up to a point, the rainfall was welcomed. But had it continued for another week, the track would have been too soft to work and we would have been in trouble. But everything has turned out perfectly."

Reconstruction of the Hollypark strip, under the supervision of Track Foreman Jack Farmer, began in January when 300 tons of course silica sand was slowly worked into the track, up to a depth of 10 inches.

"We disked the track and furrowed it, hoping for a little rain, but prepared to use our long-boom water wagon is it wasn't forthcoming," Maluvius explained.

"We only used the wagon about four times and then the rain hit us. The furrows held the

water and enabled us to get plenty of moisture to the sub soil and thoroughly soak the base.

"The rains made it much easier to rip the track deeply and provided for an excellent blending of materials during the final stages of the program. I feel the track now has more spring and bounce to it than it ever had in the past.

"We have added a new hydraulically-operated harrow

with larger, 24-inch rollers to use in conditioning the track during the meeting and I believe it will be a valuable addition to our equipment pool."

Hollypark's half-mile training track, which held up magnificently well during the heavy rains, will continue to be available to horsemen through the coming season from April 11 to July 23.

## Hot Rods Roar at Raceway

Two unusual twin-engine gas dragsters will be on the bill of fare for the sixth annual Hot Rod Magazine Drag Races Saturday and Sunday at Riverside International Raceway.

They are the NHRA record-holding Freight Train driven by Bob Muravez of Burbank and the Odd Couple, a wild creation piloted by Art LeColst of Van Nuys.

A familiar sight for the last three years on local trips, the Freight Train is one of the most popular machines in the sport. With Muravez driving it then, the twin-Chevy rail was the first gas dragster to break 200 m.p.h. and 7.50 seconds, two years ago in Wilmington.

A late comer in gas dragster racing, the Odd Couple has roared to prominence in recent weeks with good showings at the NHRA Winter Nationals and the Bakersfield U.S. Fuel and Gas meets.

It is powered by two different kinds of engines, one Chrysler and one Chevrolet, that give it total cubic inch displacement of 810.

Top marks to date for LeColst have been 198 m.p.h. and a screaming run of 7.50 seconds in the quarter-mile.

Qualifying on Saturday is expected to be torrid on the Riverside asphalt, as gas dragster drivers pare their number down to eight for Sunday eliminations. Their big inducement is a \$700 top eliminator prize, plus \$750 posted by Union Oil Co., which will be pocketed by the winner on Sunday.

Gas dragsters will provide competition in one of the eight eliminator brackets — as an estimated 300 drivers race everything from 230 m.p.h. fuelers to family sedans they drive to the track.

## Gymnastics Event Set For April

America's finest men and women gymnasts will compete against their international counterparts April 25-26 at Long Beach Arena in the first annual U.S. Gymnastics Federation World Invitational Cup.

The event will be two championships in one — the U.S.G.F. Nationals, with as many as 100 top men and women competing, and the World Invitational Cup featuring elite fields of six men and six women only.

## New Title Holders Expected in NBA

It is fairly evident as the 23rd season of the National Basketball Association draws to a close that three new title holders will appear in the Association's five major scoring categories. Only veteran Wilt Chamberlain of Los Angeles will retain his titles in rebounding and field goal percentages.

Larry Siegfried of the Boston Celtics with 321 foul throws out of 369 attempts for a .870 percentage is well ahead of the field in this department.

Oscar Robertson of the Cincinnati Royals is set to replace Chamberlain as the assist champion and the San Diego rookie Elvin Hayes is displacing Detroit's Dave Bing as individual scoring champ.

Hayes, with 2,069 points and a 29 per game average, is well ahead of runner-up Earl Monroe of Baltimore (1,878 tallies and a 25.7 game average) who jumped from fourth place to second during the past week.

Chamberlain, with a .575 field goal average, is fairly certain to hold onto his crown, leading runner-up Jerry Lucas of Cincinnati with .555. Wilt has a big margin in the rebound department, sailing along at a 21.2 per game average with 1,544 retrievals. He is followed by Bill Russell of Boston with 1,366 grabs for a 19.8 per game average.

Robertson should finish at the top of the assist column. He now has 703 feeds and a 9.8 per game average, while Len Wilkens of Seattle trails with 617 and 8.4.
