## Holidays May Be Dropped

A compromise report from the Law Committee, which is expected to have the support of both the majority and the minority views in the committee, will eliminate for Conservative Jews the second day observance of the Festivals of Shavuot, Sukkot, Shemini Atzeret and the second and eighth days of Passover.

The lengthy report will be submitted to the Law Committee for ratification in the next few weeks. It is a consensus of the views of the majority and minority outlook on the committee, and thus is considered assured of unanimous approval.

The report bases its position on strict interpretation of Halacha, Jewish law. It points out that in Israel these holidays are observed for only one day. In Hebrew the second day observance outside of Israel is called Yom Tov Sheni Shei Galuyot.

It recounts how the second day was instituted when the system of alerting the foreign communities of the advent of Rosh Hodesh, the first day of the new Jewish month, broke down. "It is quite certain," the report relates, "that had our forefathers enjoyed the world wide system of communications at our disposal, such as telephone, telegraph and jet planes, each more effective than the bonfires and messengers formerly used for this purpose, Yom Tov Sheni Shei Galuyot and even the yoma arkita, the "continuous day" (encompassing two days) of Rosh Hashanah would never have come into practice.
