**BREED OF THE WEEK** — Bull Terrier . . . Approximately 160 years ago there existed in England a type of crossbred dog that excelled at badger and bull-baiting. They came into being via a cross between the Bulldog and the now extinct English Terrier.

Known as Bulldog Terriers, these interesting dogs were coarse in head, thick through the neck and shoulders, bowed in the front legs, heavily built, usually brindle, black and tan, red brown or fawn in color. They bore little resemblance to the nicely balanced, clean outlined dog we know today and the Bull Terrier.

The change from the old type clumsy Bulldog Terrier into the modern good looking Bull Terrier started in the 1850s. An English breeder by the name of James Hinks by careful and selective breeding produced the first Bull Terrier. This foundation dog had all the courage, stamina and intelligence of the old type dog without his mongrel appearance.

The Bull Terrier gained great popularity both in America and England. He tips the scales at about 50 pounds and in height 20 inches.
