

Weather Balloon Floats to Kansas

A fourth-grade class at Carson Street Elementary School began a weather-balloon experiment recently which has turned into lessons in geography, mathematics, letter-writing, science, meteorology, vocabulary, and even neighborhood.

The class set aloft 80 experimental weather balloons on Jan. 29, each with a card attached asking that the finder fill it out and return to Carson Street School, 161 E. Carson St.

One of the balloons made a 1600-mile flight over the Rocky Mountains to a farm in Leonardville, Kan., and there the story begins.

A FARMER making his daily trek to haul silage found the deflated balloon near a grove of trees. He and his wife filled out the card, but their curiosity was piqued.

How long did it take a balloon to travel from Torrance to Leonardville in eastern Kansas?

So they sent along a self-addressed, stamped envelope asking Miss Linda Petricone's class to tell them.

The children had received cards from Solvang, Riverside, Orange County, San Bernardino and even Los Angeles International Airport.

BUT KANSAS — they barely even knew where that was.

So Miss Petricone began supplementary lessons based on the children's natural curiosity and interest. And a weather balloon experiment became much more than that.

First, the children decided to write letters to Mr. and Mrs. Fredolph Nelson, who found the balloon. Penmanship, spelling and proper letter-writing form came under discussion.

NOW THEY had to learn what states the balloon traveled over on its way to that farm. And what about the Rocky Mountains? How high are they?

Commission Grants Rate Increase

The California Public Utilities Commission has granted Southern California Gas Co. a 3.7 per cent rate increase to offset increases in the cost of gas they purchase from El Paso Natural Gas Co. and the 10 per cent federal surtax.

The increase amounts to \$21.2 million a year. Of this amount, the \$5,462,000 related to the federal surtax is temporary and will not be charged to customers when the surtax is lifted.

Impact of the increase on bills of the average residential customer will not be as great as the gas companies had requested.

WRITING to the children, Mrs. Nelson invited them to come see the farm if they were ever in Kansas.

And the answer to Mrs. Nelson's question as to how long it took a nine-inch helium-filled balloon to travel from a Carson school yard to a Kansas?

Just two days.

'Owl and Pussycat' Fine Evening in the Theater

One might find the life of a part-time book store clerk and part-time writer (whose work is too symbolic to be accepted) pretty dull, but not so with the life of Felix Sherman in Chapel Theatre's current production of Bill Manhoff's comedy "The Owl and the Pussycat."

The two-character play concerns the life of Felix (The Owl), whose use of spy glasses to observe life gets him into an unusual dilemma when he reports the profitable nocturnal habits of a young lady (The Pussycat) to her landlord.

Felix finds himself confronted by the young lady, Doris Waverly, after she is evicted from her room. So, with no where to stay, Doris decides to move in on the surprised Felix. The action of the play begins here with round after round of verbal sword fighting and name calling — all of the latter by Doris.

A BOOK wormish intellectual fellow who leads a quiet logical life, Felix is all but overpowered by the gutter-mouthed, illogical Doris. What makes the whole situation even funnier is that they eventually fall in love, but continue to wage war until the final curtain.

In the mammoth lead roles are Duke Schneider and Jo Lasman. Both are perfectly cast and work well together to provide the audience with good solid ensemble acting.

Schneider creates a clever characterization utilizing just the right amount of reverse psychology to maintain his ground against Miss Lasman. One of his best scenes occurs in the middle

of the second act when he comes home at 2 a.m., discovers that Doris is gone and actually misses her.

Jo Lasman is an attractive woman with the ability to look very catty and very warm within seconds of each other. In the opening of the play her fast and loose delivery gives the audience some fast paced laughs.

PART OF the success of "Owl and the Pussycat" must rest with director Jack Drake. He moved his actors well and gave them some interesting and extremely funny pieces of business.
