

'Inner City' Involvement To Be Adventists' Goal

A call for personal involvement in the needs of the "inner city" will be made in a special service Saturday to members of the Torrance Seventh-day Adventist Church, 1610 Acacia Ave.

"The concern we show for others must be a first-hand experience," Floyd Stark, the church's leader of lay activities, said in announcing the special program. "It must be by proximity—not by proxy; by person—not by purse."

He added that in an age noted for its "non-involvement," more thought must be given to Christ's words: "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto Me." (Matthew 25:40)

The special program will be given at 10:50 a.m. during the local church's regular weekly report of activities that emphasize Christian concern for others.

Seventh-day Adventists stress help to others. Currently the church is engaged in a large, international program of medical assistance and food distribution to the starving persons in Biafra.

Adventists operate worldwide medical work, which includes more than 300 medical institutions in 190 countries of the world. They also operate local welfare units which last year distributed more than \$11 million worth of cash and food to more than 8 million people.

Most state or area headquarters of the church also have special emergency vans for use during floods, tornadoes, riots and other civil or natural disasters.

Project Quest Theme Is 'Sex and Identity'

Youth and adults will swap ideas on "Sex and Identity" at a session of Project Quest Monday at 7:30 p.m. at the Torrance Recreation Center.

The public meetings are backed by the Torrance Youth Council and the city's Welfare Council.

Led by Tom Drucker, a UCLA doctoral student, the program will answer some questions raised last week, when 75 adults and students swapped opinions on several subjects, ranging from sex to the "society to be." The seminar series is designed to deal with topics related to modern society, the "generation gap," and particularly drug abuse.

At the last session, adults and students compared their moral concepts. Many adults thought that immorality was greatly on the upswing, while many youth thought adults were too prudish. After discussion, many found themselves closer together than they thought.

Drucker pointed out that, generally speaking, youth are more receptive to new ideas and experiments of all kinds, while their parents often are too fearful for youngsters to try new things. He pointed out how this can cause a "generation gap," and felt that discussion could narrow it.
