

Spartans Win Third Bay League Title

Basketball Repeater

Southern California's outstanding graduating senior basketball players will clash July 9 when the Second Annual Southern California All-Star Prep Basketball Classic unfolds at the Forum in Inglewood.

The doubleheader, pitting the Los Angeles City against the CIF Southern Section 4-A and the CIF Southern Section 3-A, 2-A and 1-A in a companion clash, has received approval from the National Collegiate Athletic Association and will be sponsored by the Manhattan Beach Lions Club and the Southern California Interscholastic Basketball Coaches Association.

Last year's inaugural games at the Forum were successful artistically and financially. The L.A. City All-Stars defeated their CIF-SS 4-A (then 3-A) counterparts, 113-108, in a sensational scoring duel before 7,333 thoroughly impressed spectators.

In the preliminary game, a 2-A all-star team overpowered the 1-A, 105-68.

This year, because of the expansion of the CIF Southern Section to four divisions in playoffs competition and in an attempt to even up the second feature, the 3-A, 2-A and 1-A talent will be combined and divided up into an East-West game.

Charles (Chuck) Clustka said, "The L.A. City-CIF Southern Section 4-A game is obviously the feature, but we want to have a very competitive situation in the other game, so this plan has been adopted by the coaches, with the approval of the Lions Club and NCAA."

Clustka, former UCLA basketball star who went into coaching at Harvard School in North Hollywood and is now an administrator there, will be directing the SCIBA portion of the preparations for this year's classic.

The Los Angeles City team will be selected from schools in the Eastern, Marine, Northern, Southern, Western, East Valley, Mid Valley and West Valley Leagues.

Leagues contributing to the CIF Southern Section 4-A squad are the Bay, Channel, Citrus Belt, Coast, Del Rey, Foothill, Freeway, Moore, Pacific, San Gabriel Valley, Sierra, Sky, Sunset, and Whitmont.

The 3-A, 2-A and 1-A leagues making up the West team will be Camino Real, Montview, Pioneer, Santa Barbara, and Suburban, 3-A; Frontier, Rio Hondo, San Luis, Santa Fe, and Tri-Valley, 2-A; Academy, Condor, Delphi, Olympic, Preparatory, and Tri-County, 1-A.

For the East the players will be chosen from the Angelus, Crestview, Garden Grove, Golden, Irvine, Ivy, and San Antonio, 3-A; Chapparrel, Desert-Valley, Hacienda, Imperial, and Orange, 2-A; Arrowhead, De Anza, Desert-Inyo, Hi-Lo, Mountain Desert, and Pinon, 1-A.

Each squad will consist of 15 players, with no more than two players from any single school in the L.A. City or CIF-SS 4-A. Five players from each classification will be on each squad in the East-West preliminary.

Torrance Offers Ladies' Softball

Girls and women interested in joining a softball team for league play during the summer may sign up individually or as a team.

All teams have positions available for playing, managing and coaching.

The Torrance Twilight League for girls in the seventh through ninth grades gives participants the opportunity to play a more advanced game of softball and will prepare them for a more advanced league later.

League play will begin Monday, June 16, and ends in August. Practices will be at El Nido Park, 18301 Kingsdale, from 3:30 to 6 p.m. on Mondays.

There will be a \$5 fee per team to cover the cost of the awards.

South Bay Girls League for girls 14 through 18 years will

be meeting at El Nido Park from 7 to 10 p.m. on Monday and Wednesday nights.

League play will begin Monday, June 16. A registration fee of \$15 per team is required for the cost of awards.

Women 18 years and older may participate in the night softball league which will meet on Tuesdays at El Nido Park from 7 to 10 p.m. and at McMaster Park, 3624 Artesia on Thursdays.

Practice times will be available beginning Tuesday, May 13.

Bats, ball and catchers' gear will be provided for the teams but players must supply their own gloves.

Torrance Teams Triumph

Torrance's Tappa Keggas and Wild Mustangs made a clean sweep of doubleheaders in West Coast Slo-Pitch League play Friday night.

The Tappa Keggas had little trouble in defeating El Segundo Hughes Hustlers, 5-1, and 8-0, at Alondra Park.

At Torrance Park, the Wild Mustangs beat the powerful hitting Upland Bombers, 9-3, in the first game, and then had to come from behind in the sixth inning to win the second game, 5-4. The Wild Mustangs still remain undefeated with a 10-0 record.

Mustang outfielder Andy Meyer hit 5 for 6 for the evening. Catcher Russ Bierley collected a triple in the first game with shortstop Gino Barnett scoring from first base on a single.

In other games, the Los Angeles Oldtimers, league champs (6-4), split with Hawthorne to remain in second place. Bo Polica's Lomita Old Pros also divided a doubleheader with Redondo Beach.

This Friday night, the Wild Mustangs play Los Angeles at McManus Park in Culver City. With four games remaining, the Mustangs need only one more victory to clinch the first half of the West Coast Slo-Pitch League.

The Tappa Keggas (4-6) play Redondo Beach (5-5) at Torrance Park. Lomita (4-6) meets El Segundo (1-0) at Alondra Park while Hawthorne (5-5) hosts Upland (5-5) at Eucalyptus Park. Doubleheader action starts at eight o'clock.

Four Hours Later Parnelli Wins Race

Parnelli Jones of Torrance was declared the winner of the four-hour, Wolverine Trans-American Sedan Race four hours after Mark Donohue of Media, Pa., had been ushered to victory lane and given the plaudits of a crowd of 21,648 at Michigan International Speedway, Sunday.

Jones was driving a team Mustang, one of a pair prepared for racing by famed stock car builder Bud Moore of Spartansburg, S.C.

After the finish, Homer Perry, a Ford Motor Co. official and manager of the Mustang team, asked Sports Car Club of America officials for a recheck of the timing charts.


Perry said his own charts showed Jones the winner. It was learned that at least two other private charts had the Mustang out front.

After four hours of pouring

over the charts, lap by lap, SCCA officials determined that Parnelli had not been credited with at least three circuits of the 3.31-mile course.

The oversight apparently occurred at about the three-hour mark. As it turned out, Jones officially was listed as having completed one lap more than Donohue, who was handling a Camaro owned by Roger Penske, former championship driver from Philadelphia.

Penske was given 30 minutes to protest the reversal

Girls' Track Meet Set for Carson High

Some 350 participants are enrolled in the ninth annual All-City Girls Track and Field Championships May 24 at Carson High School.

The meet will be directed by Dr. John L. Merkley. Competition is open to girls in all 47 L.A. City senior high schools.

Each school is permitted to enter two girls in each of the 11 events, except the relay. There will be four runners on each relay team.

A girl may compete in a maximum of three events, including the relay, according to Miss Carol Ghens, Youth consultant for girls activities. Six places will count in the

scoring on the following basis: 10-8-6-4-2-1. Individual awards will be presented to the first five place winners in each event.

Deadline for filing entries is Thursday. Entries should be sent to Miss Barbara O'Callaghan, Carson High School, 22328 So. Main Street.

Track events on the program are the 50-, 100-, 220- and 440-yard dashes, 880-yard run, 50-yard low hurdles and four-girl 440-yard pursuit relay.

Field events are the running long jump, high jump, shot put (8-pound) and softball throw.

South Plays In CIF

South High, by virtue of a 6-1 victory over North High and two prior decisions over Santa Monica, has won the Bay League baseball championship for the third straight year.

Coach Jerry McIvaine's Spartans will go into the CIF playoffs Friday with a home game against Morningside.

For the playoffs admission will be charged to defray the cost of the tournament. Adult admission is \$1 and student admission is 50 cents.

Morningside is the runner up in the Sky League. The Monarchs (8-4) finished a game behind Palos Verdes (9-3), but to climax the regular season they blanked Rolling Hills, 7-0, in a makeup game Monday.

Rob Boyes pitched a 2 hitter against Rolling Hills. He is the likely pitcher against South on Friday.

South, which tied Santa Monica with a 10-4 record, won both of its games against the Vikings to become the No. 1 team in the Bay League.

Coach McIvaine went through the season alternating Dennis Rector and Dan Creek on the mound. Following Creek's 6-5 championship victory over North, Rector will be called on to start against Morningside.

South catcher John Anderson singled home Ron McDaniel with a first inning run and the Spartans went on a 2-out spree for five runs in the second.

Six consecutive men got aboard as Brad Bader and Creek walked, McDaniel doubled, and Barron walked, more or less, intentionally to load the bases.

Mike Hrehor singled sharply to left to make it 3-0. With the runners taking off on a 3-2 pitch, Robbie Andrews lined a double inside third to clean the bases.

Brad Rooker replaced Terry Smyth on the mound for North and held the Spartans scoreless the remainder of the game.

After the first out in the top of the seventh, North, trailing, 6-2, scored three runs. A key blow was Royle Stillman's scoring single. A moment earlier his foul fly was dropped for an error.

Jones was paid \$5,000 for his victory. Donohue, 31, who won last season, received \$3,500.

Jones' average speed was 55.49 miles per hour.

Third was Jerry Titus of Encino, Calif., in a Pontiac Firebird. Bob Tillius of Falls Church, Va., in a Javelin, and Dick Lang of Xenia, Ohio, in a Camaro, rounded out the top five.
