Delegates Named For Boys' State

Two local high school juniors have been selected to represent the Bert S. Crossland Post 170 of the American Legion at the 1969 Boys' State session, Commander John F. Keller announced today.

The two are Robert Dobson Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert K. Dobson of 4625 Jacques St., and James Robertson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Robertson of 2707 W. 180th St.

Dobson, junior class president at West High School, and Robertson were selected from among six finalists by a committee composed of Keller; Ben Roberts, first vice commander; and Louis Deininger, adjutant.

The 1969 session of Boys' State, sponsored by the California American Legion, will be held June 21 to 28 in Sacramento, Keller said.

More than 850 boys from throughout the state will participate in the program, which will give the youths experience in state government. Delegates will organize their own political parties, campaigns, and model legislature within a mythical 51st state.

Two of the delegates to Sacramento will be selected to represent California at the 24th annual American Legion Boys' Nation July 18 to 25 in Washington, D.C.

Mrs. Young, widely known for her civic beautification activities, was instrumental in turning a Rolling Hills landfill area into the thriving South Coast Botanic Garden.

Before the meeting three ginkgos, which are one of the oldest species of trees, will be planted at the garden. The ceremony will symbolize Mrs. Young's legacy to the garden of continuity and long life.

The wide recognition of Mrs. Young's efforts will be highlighted at the dinner to be presided over by Ralph Cornell, prominent Southland landscape architect. Tributes will include a Scroll of Honor from Supervisor Burton Chace on behalf of Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors, and an award to be presented by Dr. William S.
