**Counties of Southland Follow**

**Lead of L. A. in Road Work**

Following the lead set by Los Angeles County, which is just completing the construction of about 300 miles of paved roads, for which bonds amounting to \$3,500,000 were issued, other counties of the southern end of the State are entering upon extensive highway projects.

Work on the system of good roads in Orange County, for which bonds to the value of \$1,270,000 were authorized, is well under way, and preparations are being made by Kern County to expend the \$2,500,000 in the construction of a good roads system, for which bonds have been voted.

In Los Angeles County the building of good roads has received such an impetus that now the farmers are taking the matter up, and partially at their own expense they are constructing at the present time thirty-five miles of oil macadam roads.

Other counties throughout the southern part of the State are agitating the sale of bonds for road purposes. In addition to the amount of work in this line being carried on by the various counties, the State is pushing the good roads construction, for which \$18,000,000 worth of bonds was authorized, as fast as the bond money can be secured.

It was recently announced that Los Angeles county leads all the counties in the United States in the matter of good roads, and now it is predicted that within a few years the good roads systems of Southern California will be far ahead of any others of the country.

Orange County's good roads project is considered of more than ordinary importance to the people of the southern part of the State, inasmuch as the roads to that county have been generally unimproved, and they have been the weak link in the highways from Los Angeles to San Diego.

It has been practically agreed between the members of the Board of Supervisors of Los Angeles County that a special tax of 10 cents on each \$1000 will be levied in the future for a period of about ten years to keep up the construction of paved highways. In this manner the supervisors believe that about 100 miles of roads can be built each year, making a total of 1000 miles in the ten years.

**Not All People Realize Full Value of Newspaper Space**

Every line in a newspaper costs its publisher something. If it is to benefit some individual he may fairly expect to pay something, says the Granville (O.) Times. You do not go into a grocery and ask the proprietor to hand you ten pounds of sugar for nothing even though the grocer may be a personal friend and even though the gift might not be a large one.

If the beneficiary of advertising does not pay for it the proprietor has to settle the bill. Nevertheless many people cannot seem to learn that a newspaper pays its expenses by renting space and that it is just as much entitled to collect rent for every week that space is occupied as you are for the house you rent to the tenant.

We treat religious and philanthropic enterprises liberally, yet in spite of this many of these enterprises expect the newspaper to give them space rent free. We believe we are just as generous as the average merchant on the street. We therefore cannot understand why we are repeatedly besought to give away our goods.

**SPEED MANIACS COMPELLED TO HOLD DOWN SPEEDOMETERS**

Just when the fast drivers were greasing up their speedometers in preparation for the thirty-mile limit effective January 1, the Board of Supervisors stepped in last week and slowed them up a bit in Los Angeles County. The legal speed limit in the county after January 1 will be twenty-five miles instead of the twenty now in effect. But even this increase is five miles slower than the maximum fixed by the State law.

However, there is a provision, giving the counties authority to regulate the speed, so the Board of Supervisors' action is without legal question. And while the board was at work on the speed question it also passed these ordinances:

Heavy vehicles with wheels equipped with cleats or spike barred except by special permission.

Maximum load fixed at fourteen tons, or 800 pounds per square inch of tire.

Speed limit for four-tons, fifteen miles; six tons, twelve miles, provided vehicle has rubber tires—six if metal tires.

The limit for all vehicles at crossings is fifteen miles an hour.
