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Has a non-union man the right to live and work in this nation?

According to the constitution of the United States he has and also as is entitled to full protection in his person and property under our Union of free states.

According to the "closed shop" advocate, however, a non-union man would be denied the right to work until he joined certain labor unions, paid dues and abided by its rules.

There is no fight on labor, organized or unorganized, but there is a fight on against the attempt of "class" to over-ride the freedom of the individual to live and work, as guaranteed by the one great union, the United States.

EMPLOYEE STOCKHOLDERS

It will only be a question of time when the great railroads of the country will be largely owned by the employes.

On the Union Pacific the men and women on the payrolls are gradually acquiring more and more ownership in the property.

The great Southern Pacific system has now put on an employe-ownership campaign to enable employes on its lines to buy stock on easy terms.

Beginning February 1, 1922, any employe can purchase one to fifteen share of the common stock at the open market price.

The purchases can be made at the rate of five dollars per month withheld from the monthly paycheck as a minimum, and more if desired.

Common stock was quoted at \$1.50 last week, and pays six per cent dividends, seven and one-half on this investment.

Employes are not limited to five dollar a month payments but can pay off their subscription in a lump sum and subscribe for more.

Under the Hoover plan of settling all differences between employes and employers without strikes, railroad stocks should advance steadily.
