

ROLLER SKATING

IS COMING BACK

Every Indication That There Will
Be More of It This Spring
Than Ever.

This will be a great year for out-
door pastimes.

The war tax of 10 per cent on all
athletic goods was taken off by con-
gress with the beginning of this year
and the elimination of this tax to-
gether with reductions in price of
athletic equipment puts things just
about where they were before the
war. The last two years have been
though ones for those in the sporting
goods business because the high
prices have kept individuals and
teams from purchasing new goods.
This year, however, with the decrease
in the cost of things the old uniforms
and other implements are being cast
aside and every one expects to begin
the season with new things.

"This means much to the United
States," said Hurum E. Reeve, of the
local Winchester store yesterday "be-
cause participation in outdoor sports
will make for a healthier nation. It
is the duty of every parent to see that
his youngsters are interested in some
healthy pastime and to give some
time each day to it. Building the
body is just as important as building
the mind.

"One sport that has been more or
less dormant for several years and
which is coming back this season,"
said Mr. Reeve, "is roller skating.
Last winter was the pretest in his-
tory for ice skating," said Mr. Reeve,
"and the ice skaters are turning to
roller skating for spring pleasure. In
many cities the community service has
added roller skating to its list of re-
creations and wherever this has been
done the city authorities have become
interested.

"In New York City the Central
Park walks, of which there are sev-
eral miles, are used at all times by
roller skaters, and City Hall Park,
which covers one block, will be closed
for roller skating each evening, as it
was last year. In the neighborhood
of 200 children could be found skat-
ing in front of Mayor Hylan's office
every evening last summer.

"In Gary, Ind., last year the Y. M.
C. A. conducted a series of roller
skating races for the school boys of
the city. The mayor ordered a num-
ber of paved streets closed so that
the racers could speed up without
any fear of injury. Some 75 boys
participated in these races and hun-
dreds of people watched them.

"In many collegiate and other in-
stitutions of learning roller skating
clubs have been formed, and Boy
Scouts, Camp Fire Girls and Win-
chester Junior Rifle Corps units have
extended their work to enjoy roller
skating. I haven't any doubt but
that in hundreds of cities this spring
there will be roller skate block par-
ties, city and state championship rol-
ler skating races, and in many places
community roller skating.

"New Haven, Conn., has a roller
skating club comprised of girls. I
wouldn't be surprised if many of
these clubs were formed this year.
It is a wholesome sport and one that
should be encouraged."

GET-TOGETHER MEETING

Last Saturday evening a get-to-
gether meeting was planned by the
mothers and fathers of the Tor-
rance Boy Scouts at the suggestion
of Mrs. Fred Lessing, who felt
there should be a closer union be-
tween the mothers and fathers of

the committee in charge, the fact
leaked out, but a good time was
enjoyed nevertheless. Scout Mas-
ter Moore was present and address-
ed the Scouts. Miss Hanaska
pleased the Scouts very much with
her specially baked cakes decorat-
ed with the Boy Scouts insignas
in fancy icing.
