

HARBOR DISTRICT BULLETIN

The District Rally on Saturday evening at the Fifth Street School was a big success, with about 150 Scouts present from Harbor City, Lomita, San Pedro and Torrance. Tests for the district will be given at the times, places and in kind as follows:

Indoor tests at Harbor City, Friday evening, June 2; Lomita, Monday evening, May 29; San Pedro, Fifth Street School, Monday evening, June 5, and Torrance, Friday evening, May 26. Outdoor tests for the entire district, in the George F.

Canyon of the Palos Verdes Hills Saturday, May 27.

At the Rally on Saturday evening the troop leaders present decided on the following standardization of the uniform for use in the district: Regulation Scout uniform with wrapped or spiral leggings; metal letters and number to be worn on the collar of the old style coat; on the shirt collar when the new style coat is worn; felt number indicating troop number to be worn on the left shoulder of both old and new style coats; patrol colors as an embroidered badge to be worn on the right shoulder of

both new and old style coat; neckties of the troop color when new style coat is worn and neckchief of the troop color when no coat is worn, and merit badges to be attached to coat sleeve round and not square. The colors adopted by the San Pedro Troops as accepted by the troop leaders are: Troop No. 2, green; Troop No. 3, royal blue, and Troop No. 5, red. The executive committee for the district was decided upon as follows: The Deputy Scout Commissioner, Dr. Clayton, of San Pedro, and Mr. Post, of Torrance. A HUSBAND'S LOVE

In "The Marionettes," which will be shown at the Torrance Theatre on Sunday, June 4, Clara Kimball Young, the star, gives a dual characterization which ranks among the finest things she has contributed to the screen, first as the neglected wife who seems to have lost all the charm of courtship days, and afterward as the brilliant social butterfly who succeeds in forcing her husband to woo and win a second time. The story is one that has universal interest, but should particularly appeal to every housewife. It shows a happily married couple gradually drifting apart because of the wife's carelessness in her personal appearance and lack of taste in selecting her clothes. She soon presents the appearance of an unattractive tramp so entirely different from the charming girl whom her husband wooed in courtship that he wonders how he ever happened to select her as a life companion. She loves him so deeply that she cannot conceive of his failing to reciprocate. But her slovenliness and altogether lack of personal care drives him from the home fireside, and he seeks the companionship of women who are anxious to appear at their best. The wife is left alone at home night after night, wondering what has changed her husband, and desperately tries to find means to win him back. One evening she attends an amateur theatrical performance called "The Marionettes." In this play the feature situation is one identical with her own, viz., a young wife who is careless after marriage and drives the husband away from her. In the story the

wife puts herself under the care of beauty experts, modistes, milliners, etc., with the result that she emerges a ravishing beauty who sweeps everything before her, and forces her husband to woo her all over again. Profiting by what she has seen, the neglected wife, played by Miss Young, proceeds along the same lines, and to her amazement she finds that not only is her husband even more attentive than during courtship days, but that all of his men friends are anxious to curry her favor. Miss Young in "The Marionettes" is supported by a superb cast of players, including Nigel Barrie, who plays the part of the husband, Corliss Giles and Edwin Kimball.
