equal to the energy and efforts of its founders. Mr. Chas. Keeran was selected and the Fair became a real celebration. Besides the amusement feature which was on a much larger scale, the industrial exhibits required over 15,000 feet of space.

This year, with 48,000 feet of space for exhibits alone, Torrance expects to eclipse all its former efforts. It is not exaggerating to say that from 2,500 to 3,000 people will come to Torrance daily during the life of the Fair, this year. Mr. Keeran still has charge of the management and has again provided the amusements as well as the building of the exhibits, and the co-operation of the merchants have been greater this year than last.
