TORRANCE GAS GUSHER NOW IN

Within four miles of Torrance the oil well on the property of the Standard Oil Company suddenly broke forth.

With a roar that could be heard two miles distant and throwing water and mud 150 feet into the air, well No. 1 in the Standard Oil Company's new field on the El Segundo boulevard, near Bell station "came in" Monday afternoon with one of the largest and most violent flows of natural gas yet struck in this section of the state. A steady increase in pressure was perceptible as the flow continued but up to a late hour last night the well was showing no indication of oil.

A crew of drillers and derrick men narrowly escaped injury when the flow, without warning, and unexpected by the crew, started. Drilling had reached 1100 feet and several men were engaged in balling out the "hole" when an ominous rumbling underground started them running from the derrick.

A few seconds later the air was filled with mud, gas and bits of the partly demolished derrick. Within a few minutes after the flow started the roadways in the vicinity of the well were blocked with automobiles of spectators, some of whom lingered for hours in hope of seeing the gas bring in oil. Employees of the company were stationed along the road near the well warning motorists not to stop for fear of ignition of the well from exhausts.

No attempts can be made to cap the well until the present pressure has diminished. While officials of the oil company do not believe that drilling had reached a point deep enough to strike oil, they say that it is possible for the gas flow to be followed by one of oil, even at the present depth, and everything is in readiness in the event that this happens.

The greatest activity in oil properties is being developed in the El Segundo district as well as that of Manhattan, where 55 prospective oil wells are being contemplated. The Standard Oil Company, it is understood, have taken additional leases on 400 acres with the intent of developing oil wells; The Union Oil Company has leased 350 acres, and the General Petroleum Company has secured leases on another 80 acres, all not far distant from Torrance.

A large load of lumber was dumped on the Carson estate on the boulevard leading to Redondo Beach, Beach, and while one well derrick is erected and operating, it may be that startling news will be coming our way most any day.

EIGHT MILLIONS IN BONUSES TO FORD CO. EMPLOYES

For eight hours today, three paymasters are working at top speed paying out to Ford Motor Company employees their share of the eight million dollars bonus money which the company is handing out. Each man received between \$100 and \$125 according to his length of service. It is estimated that about three thousand men can be paid off each day, and on this basis five weeks of steady work will be required to distribute the huge sum. About \$250,000 was handed out today.

SCENIC ROAD IS PROBABLE

The Palos Verdes Syndicate, owners of the big 16,000 acres Palos Verdes ranch South of Lomita and Torrance are very willing to cooperate in extending Western avenue from Lomita to the ocean and give a scenic route into San Pedro over the mesa according to C. J. Colden of the City Planning Commission.

Mr. Colden had an interview with Jay Lawyer, Los Angeles manager of the ranch a few days ago and found that Lawyer was much interested in the extension. Originally the syndicate planned to construct a network of private roads through the ranch all of which have been surveyed. Lawyer stated however that he would be glad to dedicate a public road for the extension of Western avenue if the county would improve it and San Pedro provide a connecting link through the Averill Weymouth tract or other suitable outlets.

Lawyer also desires the co-operation of San Pedro in getting the state highway commission to make the extension of the coast line road between San Pedro and Redondo and wanted to know what San Pedro was doing about it. The Palos Verdes syndicate has offered to underwrite the bonds for this piece of road but it is said that certain interests in Los Angeles are using their influence to block the road and prevent the state from building it because it might divert traffic now going through Los Angeles to the coast resorts.
