WHO WILL PAY THE WAR BILL?

If Germany doesn't pay, France must. In effect, that is the reply of a large section of the press of the United States to those economists who insist that the war bill presented to Germany by the Allies—226,000,000,000 gold marks, payable in forty-two years, plus 12 per cent export tax—is more than that nation can pay. "The astonishing fact is that it does not seem to have occurred to these British and American leaders for Germany that if she does not pay for the devastation she methodically wrought, her victims," exclaims the Philadelphia North American which points out that "when it is argued that the sum demanded in reparations should be reduced, this means precisely that sufferers from her aggression shall be penalized to the extent of the remission."

On the other hand, some editors are convinced that the Allies are demanding more than Germany can pay. "France wants Germany's blood, and it deserves Germany's blood, but it must get it by transfiguration, not by murder," remarks the Louisville Courier-Journal. "Germany can never pay the 226,000,000,000 gold marks indemnity," exclaims the Seattle Times and the New York Evening World characterizes the reparations program as "amazing and impossible."


