YOUNG MEN'S BIBLE CLASS OF BAPTIST CHURCH HAVE BANQUET SERVED

The Young Men's Bible Class of the First Baptist Sunday School had their first class supper in Steffen Hall last Saturday night and it was a grand success. The hall was decorated with U. S. flags and nine large bouquets of carnations. It was a happy and hungry company of young people, comprising a large number of young men and fifteen guests, mostly young ladies, that sat down to a banquet fit for a king and served in a very satisfactory manner by caterer Roberts. There were many favorable comments on the appearance of the tables and the quality of the courses served which consisted of soup, roast, mashed potatoes, peas, fruit salad, bread and butter, ice cream, cake and coffee.

A prayer, thanking God for His blessings and provision made for this occasion, was offered by Pastor Thorpe, after which, Star Spangled Banner was sung, Miss Virginia Watson at the piano.

When all were seated Mr. Roloff took a flashlight picture and showed a proof before the banquet was finished. A goodly number of photos were ordered.

After the banquet Mr. Anderson spoke words of welcome to the invited guests of the class and briefly outlined plans of work for the future, which will be largely among young men and far reaching. The organization promises to become a great power for good in this community.

The officers of the organization, who will be elected, hereafter, every three months, were appointed by Teacher Andem, in accordance with the wish of the class and are, W. H. Tolson, President; Amel Anderson, vice-president; Frank Leitner, secretary; E. T. Curran, treasurer.

After dinner speeches were then in order and Mr. Leitner, the newly appointed secretary and chairman of the social committee, was the first called upon, who made a good address and received much applause. His subject was sociability and he emphasized strongly the importance and advantages of young people being sociable and all getting acquainted with each other at any social gathering.

Mr. Anderson, the newly appointed vice-president, spoke principally on the opportunity the young men have for good in the Christian Endeavor Society. Mr. Curran, treasurer, in his usual pleasing and humorous manner, created considerable merriment, notwithstanding he was unexpectedly called upon to say something. It seems that the speech which he had hoped to borrow and deliver was mislaid and he wished to be excused from making a lengthy address. Capt. Curtiss Tolson of the Base Ball Association of the class, was called upon and said, in his enthusiastic way, that he was getting together a "line-up" of the ball team. Anyone passing the hall might have thought a "game" was on, by the hand clapping applause that Capt. Tolson received, which indicates that the team will receive a hearty backing by the entire class and all will "route" for it. The team is booked for a little time all its own, in the near future. F. N. Antoine was the last speaker to be called upon from the class members, and those sitting at his table were undoubtedly glad to have the opportunity to finish their supper, for Mr. Antoine had kept them quite busy laughing during the banquet, by his lively conversation.

On account of business and necessary duties, D. C. Turner, Supt. of the Sunday school, and H. W. Tolson, the newly appointed president, were unable to be present, much to the regret of those attending.

Rev. Stanley H. Thorpe, pastor

of the church, spoke earnestly to the class and was much impressed on seeing so large a gathering at such an occasion. The young men like their pastor very much and appreciated the good words and advice he said to them.

The principal speaker of the evening was Carl Bassett, the Whirlwind Evangelist, who recently spent two weeks in good work at the church, and who made a great sacrifice to come to Torrance specially to be at this banquet, but that is just like Mr. Bassett. He had undivided attention of everyone present from the moment he rose until he finished his address. The latter part of his speech was very serious and forceful and emphasized the power for good such a class organization of young men have in the city of Torrance.

The exercises closed with singing "Onward Christian Soldiers."

An invitation was received yesterday at this office to attend a convention to be held in Pasadena next week for the purpose of extending more liberal patronage of the free automobile camping parks.
