Torrance was selected because of its adaptability for a distributing center for this class A-1 building material, and other conditions being ideal for the year around manufacture of cement blocks.

Several contractors who have seen the hydro-stone blocks stated they would use it in the construction of new homes, even this month, were they able to get it in sufficient quantities, so favorably were they impressed with this new building material.
