ARTIFICIALLY DRIED FRUIT

Recent experiments in dehydrating various kinds of fruit at the Agricultural Experiment Station of the University of California seem to promise an increased outlet for California fruit crops, according to a progress report on the "Dehydration of Fruits" just published by the College of Agriculture at Berkeley.

A summary of methods recommended for the dehydration of various fruits as given in Bulletin 330 will satisfy a widespread interest in the subject of dehydration. The investigations recorded were made possible by funds appropriated for deciduous fruit investigation by the state legislature of 1919.
