CHARGES OF EMBEZZLEMENT

A warrant was issued out of the Justice of the Peace Court Tuesday, charging Cameron M. Bean, formerly assistant cashier of the Dominguez Land Corporation, Torrance, with grand larceny. Bean and \$1500 in currency disappeared from the company's office at the same time according to the complaint.

Last Monday several hundred dollars were received from Japanese tenants of the land company, it being too late in the day to make a bank deposit and the money was locked in the safe. The following morning Bean reported at the office as usual and shortly after Mr. Deininger had unlocked the safe he (Bean) made excuses that he had forgotten his key to the money box in the safe at his apartments in the El Prado. He started up the street and that is the last seen of him in Torrance. The loss was not discovered until several minutes after when some one came into pay a water bill. Mr. Deininger remembered then what Bean had said about his key and wondered at his delay in returning. He used his own key to open the money box and over \$1500 was gone. A warrant was immediately asked and the big hunt was on.

FORD CAR TURNS OVER

Trapped between an Oldsmobile car in front and a stage at the back, Joe Anderson turned his Ford car suddenly to avoid striking the machine in front and turned completely over. This happened Tuesday afternoon on Guadalupe avenue at 4:20 o'clock as the occupants of the car were returning to their home after their day's work.

It is miraculous that the accident did not result fatally to some of the men at least. J. C. Anderson had his face cut, arm badly sprained and many bruises about the body. Joe Anderson was rendered unconscious and his back and hip sprained. Mr. Brody was probably the most seriously injured of all, as his face, neck, and hands were very severely cut by glass from the windshield. Dr. Leake was called immediately and found it necessary to take a number of stitches to close the lacerations. Bennie Blackburn another occupant of the ill-fated car escaped without injury. The men were removed to their homes where they are thanking their lucky stars that they were not more seriously hurt.

Santa Fe Well No. 1 Flows at Rate Of 5400 Bbls. Day

Excitement was running high yesterday over the recent flow of oil that broke out Wednesday evening and for four hours looked like a gusher well was likely to come in at any moment. During those four hours over 900 barrels of the finest grade of oil gushed to the surface and then subsided. Several weeks ago when the flow of oil came in the depth was 3035 feet, and as the oil began to subside drilling was resumed until a depth of 3101 feet was reached, when the second flow started again. It is thought that the top of the sand was drilled into, which released the flow of 900 barrels before it again became clogged. Immediately the hole was filled with

water and heavy mud, and drilling operations will be resumed shortly.

By going down the additional 66 feet a fine grade of high grade gas was encountered, reports from the well stating that the escaped gas was rich and carried with it a strong pressure. Should the well be brought in at the same rate as on Tuesday night the flow would be between 6000 and 7000 barrels a day of very fine oil. Ever since the well was spudded in there has been the utmost confidence in the future of this well, and everyone feels confident that Torrance has been and is on the very verge of a big oil boom.

TRUSTEES IN IMPORTANT MEETING PASS RESOLUTIONS FOR NEEDED IMPROVEMENTS

Torrance trustees in regular meeting Tuesday evening started proceedings which will bring to a vote the question of several very necessary major improvements, the completion of which will place Torrance in the position it should hold as the modern industrial city.

Resolutions were unanimously passed instructing the city attorney to draft an ordinance calling election on the following subjects which will be reported in detail:
First, the paving of Arlington avenue from the city's southern boundary to Carson street to a width of fifty feet with five inches of Willite, and the surfacing of Carson avenue from the west boundary of the city to Cedar street just west of the school to a width of twenty feet with four inches of the same material. This material was chosen by the city engineer and council after comparison as to cost and durability. Willite was used in the paving of the Harbor Boulevard over Nigger Slough, and has stood the heavy traffic as nothing else, in spite of the fact that the traffic is concentrated on a twenty foot roadway, as against thirty foot width where other material was used. The slipperiness of the boulevard under fog or light rain is due to the use of fine local material, and will be overcome on our work by the use of coarse aggregate in the top surface.

The trustees believe the improvement of Carson and Arlington as described above will be of benefit to the entire city as well as to the property owners paying those particular streets, and have therefore started the proceedings in such a way that half the expense will be borne from a municipal bond issue and half by the property owners directly affected. The portion to be borne by the bond issue was estimated in the engineer's report to be \$57,000.00.

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RECOVERING FROM INJURIES
