**ANAHEIM AND ORANGE WILL HALT DERRICKS**

**Both Cities Have Voted Against Drilling Inside Limits**

Residents of Orange and Anaheim, Orange county, are determined not to let oil derricks despoil their cities.

The Anaheim city trustees, backed by popular opinion, have just passed a zoning ordinance specifically prohibiting the drilling of oil wells in the city limits.

Trustees of the city of Orange have passed through second reading an ordinance similar to the one now in effect in Torrance, prohibiting the erection of oil derricks. The Orange ordinance, like the one passed in Torrance, provides a penalty of \$300 a day for violation.

**Dance Each Night At Redondo Beach All Through Winter**

In response to the greater popularity of Redondo Beach, the Pacific Electric railway has decided to keep the dance pavilion open every night this winter (Mondays excepted). This is the first winter that such an extensive program has been offered.

A series of special nights has been arranged for the winter season. Every Tuesday will be Barn Dance night; Wednesday, Lucky Spot dances will be featured; Thursday is Society night; Friday, College night; and Saturday, Music Specialty night. There will be dancing Sundays from 2:30 to 6:30 and 7:30 to midnight.

The bath house will be open daily from 10 a. m. to 10 p. m., and Sundays from 8 a. m. to 6 p. m.


