## WILL PIPE LONG BEACH GAS TO TORRANCE

### Natural Gas to Come In From the Outside Districts

Owing to the enormous winter demand on the Southern California Gas Company's plant, T. J. Prothero, the general manager has decided that it will be impossible to supply the Sherwood brick-making plant at Torrance with gas until Spring.

With the understanding that they would be supplied with necessary gas for the making of brick E. L. Sherwood and associates of Long Beach recently acquired several acres of land in the eastern section of the city where they had discovered an unusually fine grade of brick clay.

Men were put to work erecting temporary buildings and expensive machinery was ordered from the east, when it was found that the gas company was unable to supply the manufacturers with gas.

Mr. Sherwood, accompanied by Secretary Pottinger of the Torrance chamber of commerce spent Saturday with the officials of the gas company with the result that all brick-making operations have been called off until the winter demand for heating gas has subsided when the brick company will be supplied.

The gas company is now said to be satisfied that this natural supply is almost inexhaustible and work on the pipe lines will begin at once.

### No Foot Strain With the Maxwells

Dr. Cross explained that habitual wearing of pointed shoes by many motorists had tended to weaken their feet, due to cramping and overlapping of the bones. As a result, when the foot is held for long periods on the accelerator button, or a quick thrust on brake or clutch pedal occurs, a lesion or bruise is effected which is the signal for "automobile foot" to set in, accompanied by acute pains, starting usually in the second toe and running down into the ball of the foot.

The doctor said these pains may persist for some time before the patient begins to realize the cause, and the new affliction often thus has opportunity to become quite flagrant before medical aid is sought.
