
#### SET DEADLINE ON VET PLEAS

Motion by Mr. Post, seconded by Mr. Hyde, that the president appoint Mr. Versal M. Bates as meteorologist for the Torrance Chamber of Commerce, and that Mr. Bates be notified by letter to that effect. Motion carried.

Mr. Briney read the report of Mr. James W. Cutler on the books and finances of the Chamber up to November 1st, 1922. Matter discussed, but no action taken.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned until Monday, November 20th, 1922, at 1:30 p. m.

### 'Shimmy Machine' on U. S. Liners Gives Hope for Relief to Fat Folk
