Osborne was a "kindly man who acted in harmony with the highest precepts of enlightened conscience and fervent patriotism. Hon. Hugh Pomeroy addressed the meeting in a vein similar to that of his recent address in Gardena relative to bills he introduced to enable the State Highway Commission to make parks and other scenic reservations, and to enable boards of county supervisors to appoint county park commissioners. The Pomeroy bills were endorsed by the meeting.

Bouquets of compliments were passed around by the president who called upon each member of the legislature present to arise and each was introduced in turn. Hon. Bedham, Dawson, Pomeroy, Carter and finally Hon. Fred Roberts of Los Angeles, a colored member who is a veteran in the legislature. He was accompanied by his wife, and he made a fine response to the courtesy paid.

The highways are like Banquo's ghost; they are at every meeting of these organizations. Hon. Henry E. Carter spoke at length upon the subject, saying: "The Highway Commission says there are 2500 miles of completed highways and 3900 uncompleted. It is computed that the cost is \$20,000 a mile. The \$40,000,000 completed only the 2,500 miles and it will require \$135,000,000 to complete the highway now for which no provision is made. The proposed coast highway, Oxnard to Capistrano, at \$25,000 per mile, 130 miles, would cost \$3,250,000. We receive \$1,500,000 from the federal government and that is of hardly any help toward the \$135,000,000. From what source are we to get the money for completing these highways?"

The matter was turned over to a committee of seven with Mr. Geo. Proctor of Torrance as chairman. The committee having full power to act as far as the Fourth District chamber of commerce is concerned as to the course it should pursue. This committee of seven met Wednesday night last in Long Beach with about 300 present and passed a resolution recommending that the supervisors call an election for the purpose of dividing the county into seven instead of five supervisorial districts. The meeting was outspoken in its condemnation of the neglect of the road conditions in and about the harbor district, Long Beach and other sections. It is quite possible recall proceedings will follow against McClellan and others if the action of the supervisors is arbitrary in their present plans to divide the


