1922 Ship-to-shore conversation by wire and wireless between Bell telephones in homes and offices and the S. S. America 400 miles at sea in the Atlantic.
1923 14,050,565 Bell telephone stations owned and connected. Successful demonstration of trans-oceanic radio telephony from a Bell telephone station in New York City to a group of scientists and journalists in New Southgate, England.

Keep Chicks Free From Coccidiosis

For the curing of ordinary derangements of digestion we know nothing better than a solution of condensed buttermilk. Chicks should have their first drink of buttermilk when they are seven days old. Give them a five per cent solution (one part condensed buttermilk to 19 parts water) from morning until noon, about three times per week. After they are five weeks old watch carefully for any appearance of coccidiosis, and in the event that blood is noticed in the droppings, there are three things to do at once. First, reduce the mash at least 50 per cent. Second, give 10 per cent solution buttermilk for one day, and remove all other drinking water. Continue with a five per cent solution of buttermilk for three or four days. Third, give the chicks an abundance of green food, and in severe cases remove all mash and feed only grain feed with the greens. Place a board in front of the drinking fountain so that the first sign of blood will be detected. Blood in the droppings will show in from 48 to 72 hours before the chicks actually begin to die from coccidiosis. The "Co-Operative Poultryman," issue of June, 1919, goes quite fully into cause and prevention of coccidiosis; and the April, 1920, issue is entirely devoted to the proper use of buttermilk.

We can't imagine anything that would stir up as much trouble in this country as to have a national "Tell-the-Truth-Week."

NOTICE INVITING BIDS FOR PURCHASE OF FRANCHISE.

Notice is hereby given that the Board of Trustees of the City of Torrance propose to grant a 21-year franchise for a railway to cross certain streets and alleys in the City of Torrance at points designated on that certain plat on file in the office of the City Clerk of the City of Torrance and attached to the application of the Santa Fe Ry. Co.'s application for franchise dated January 3, 1923, and that said franchise when issued will be conditioned upon the beginning of construction work upon the first of said crossings within six months from the date of adoption of the ordinance granting such franchise, and on the further condition that beginning not later than 18 months after the said date of adoption of such ordinance there shall be operated thereafter during the life of such franchise one train daily in each direction over such railway between the southern terminal of said railway and the Los Angeles City proper, and the construction work on said crossings shall be done so that the railway tracks across said streets when completed shall conform to grades of the City of Torrance and all boulevard approaches to such tracks shall be constructed at the expense of the grantee under such franchise.

Said franchise will be granted upon the further condition that there shall be maintained at each of the crossings of said railway over Arlington Avenue and Carson Street respectively a standard approved automatic "wig-wag" signaling device equipped with red light visible in either direction on the said respective streets under normal conditions for a distance of five hundred feet.

Bids are hereby requested for the purchase of such a franchise said bids to be filed with the City Clerk not later than 7:30 P. M., March 27th, 1923, at which time same will be opened and declared and notice is hereby given that said franchise will be awarded to the bidder offering to pay the City of Torrance the greatest sum as compensation for the use or possession of such franchise.

Said bids must be in accordance with ordinance No. 31 of the City of Torrance and must be accompanied by certified check of not less than \$100.00 payable to City Treasurer as a fund out of which to pay all expenses connected with such application, and every bid shall be accompanied with a certified check for not less than \$500.00 so payable as a guarantee of good faith.
