**DRUGGISTS TO ERECT COURT ON EL PRADO**

Officials of the Beacon Drug Co. Buy Choice Lots

C. F. Buchanan and Albert F. Killian, president and manager, respectively, of the Beacon Drug Company, of San Pedro, in addition to taking a long lease on one of the stores in the new Sam Rapaport building, have invested in residence property in Torrance. Through the efforts of the Torrance Investment Company, who recently purchased the Dominguez Land Corporation's office building and who now occupy a portion of that structure, Messrs. Buchanan and Killian were shown the imperative need of homes for workmen and others in Torrance and purchased four lots on the north side of El Prado opposite the first park.

It is the intention of the druggists to erect on their property two bungalow courts and plans are now being prepared for a group of buildings of this kind that will be a credit to the city and an architectural addition to El Prado.

**TWO PEDDLARS FINED**
