RESOLUTION FOR RECALL IS ADOPTED

C. of C. Directors Ask That Steps Be Taken to Oust McClellan

Before the final adoption of the resolution printed below, directors of the Chamber of Commerce devoted considerable time to a discussion of the second section of the resolution demanding the recall of County Supervisor McClellan.

The resolution, which was presented to the Fourth District Chambers of Commerce at its recent meeting by Secretary Gadeky and which received the endorsement of that body with instructions to send a copy to each of the local chambers in the district, was opposed by Director Klusman and upheld by the secretary and Director Neill.

While all the directors present were heartily in favor of the division of this district into seven instead of four supervisorial districts, Directors Harwood, Klusman and others expressed the opinion that such a recommendation for recall of the supervisor for this district would be without avail.
Director Neill concurred in this view but said that he believed the Torrance Chamber of Commerce should go on record condemning the official acts of the supervisor as "he had shamefully neglected this portion of the district and was spending the people's money in his home town section."

"If the Torrance chamber," said Neill, "can be instrumental in securing the recall of McClellan it will have accomplished enough for one year."
Director Harwood stated that while he was heartily in accord with the first section of the resolution he was opposed to the recall portion as the term of office of McClellan was so short that he would undoubtedly be out of office before the recall could be put into effect and that nothing but the further enmity of the official could be gained by taking the recall stand.

Following is the resolution in full:
BE IT RESOLVED, that the Fourth District Chamber of Commerce appoint a committee of ten representatives from the Fourth District, same to be appointed by the president of the Fourth District Chamber of Commerce, to provide ways and means for the calling of an election to have a board of freeholders elected to frame a new charter for this county, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this committee provide ways and means for the recall of the supervisor of the Fourth District.

HOOVER ON RUSSIA

With characteristic clearness Secretary Hoover gives the reasons that fully justify Secretary Hughes' announcement of a refusal to extend official recognition to the Soviet government. Hoover knows Russia and the Russians, not from maps and books but by travel and personal contact. He has been engaged in the seemingly hopeless task of trying to help them, and is convinced that they will remain practically helpless until they begin to help themselves.

In stating that it is a "hopeless illusion" that a flow of money or business toward Russia would follow recognition of the Soviet, he says that Russia's real salvation must come from within and "all that charitable relief can hope to do is to lift special groups from utter destitution up to the level of the general poverty and thus to prolong life for the future."

"Who would be free themselves must strike the blow," and until Russia strikes and kills Bolshevism she must remain in bondage—a worse bondage than any ever endured under the Czars from the Terrible to Nicholas the Terrible. Communism never has been a success and never will be while human nature remains anything like what it has been from the beginning of recorded time. The shores of history are strewn with the wrecks of Communist experiments, but history meant nothing to the Bolsheviks when they started on their mad venture. About the only compensation in the Russian calamity is that it will stand for all times as a glaring poster proclaiming the bloodshed of Bolshevism and the starvation inevitable in attempts at Communism.
