**ORGANIZATION  
OF REALTY  
BOARD**

Real Estate Dealers  
Effect Program of  
Publicity

Progress, Optimism and Boost, with a capital B was the spirit of the Monday meeting of the realtors of Torrance who were called together Tuesday noon by Secretary Gadeky of the Chamber of Commerce of the purpose of organizing a realty board and to aid the chamber and other business men and organizations in advertising this city to the outside world.

The idea of raising a fund for advertising purposes was conceived Monday and by Tuesday morning every realtor in the city had signified his willingness to not only attend the next day's meeting but contribute his share of the expense to the necessary publicity campaign.

Preceded by a luncheon at the El Prado cafe at one o'clock the business session was called to order in the Chamber of Commerce and C. A. Paxman elected temporary chairman and Secretary Gadeky as temporary secretary.

The object of the meeting, that of organizing a realty board as an adjunct of the Chamber of Commerce, was explained by Mr. Gadeky, who then introduced J. W. Macdowell of the Torrance Investment Comptny.

In substance, Mr. Macdowell said:

"In my opinion and that of many other realty operators with whom I have broached the subject we need outside publicity to draw the investors to Torrance."

"Many other communities, with much less to offer prospective investors than has Torrance, are reaping a harvest by the use of the advertising columns of the Los Angeles and Long Beach newspapers, and the time is at hand when we should patronize these mediums if we expect to attract the attention of those with money to spend in buying property."

"Due to the money heretofore spent by the Dominguez Land Corporation we have been enabled to have a certain amount of free publicity given Torrance by the Los Angeles and Long Beach papers but unless we spend some money in advertising this gratuitous advertising will cease."

"We can't afford to let it cease. It must be kept up in a constructive, systematic manner over a period of at least 12 months and we believe that every realtor in Torrance should contribute a certain amount monthly for this purpose."

The realtors were at this point reassured by Secretary Gadeky that they were not expected to bear the entire burden of the advertising campaign but simply to do their "bit" and that the Chamber of Commerce would do theirs, as would the Business Men's Association.

J. C. Smith, also of the Torrance Investment Company, stated that he understood the Dominguez Land Corporation had begun an advertising campaign and that if sufficient funds were raised by the civic organizations to care for the Los Angeles advertising expense, the land company would look after the Long Beach papers. In the course of his remarks Mr. Smith impressed upon the realtors to neglect no occasion to claim the oil wells in this vicinity as being "in the Torrance oil field."
