**PREDICTS U. S.
WILL WAGE 5
GREAT WARS**

BERLIN, April 5.—Anton Johanson, the little old Swedish farmer who predicted the World War, now declares the United States will, during the next 30 years, wage five great wars.
One of these will result from complications in Canada and the other four will be civil wars.
Johanson's predictions to date have been accurate. He isn't the average kind of professional seer. And now Johanson predicts:
Five wars in America.
A great English-Indian war, about 1925, beginning with uprisings in northern India. The decision will be reached in Delhi and Calcutta, after 25,000,000 have lost their lives. The Indians will literally drive the English into the sea, after which India will tear herself from Britain's grasp and Egypt and Africa will follow her example.
Then France and Spain will battle on Spanish soil in 1930. Johan-

son does not predict who will win. During the next 30 years Germany will witness a series of bloody revolutions especially in the southwest. Other revolutions are scheduled for England, Russia, Austria, China and overseas colonies. In 1953 France will invade Norway and Russia will overrun Sweden.
Great plagues will sweep the world during this time. Another Spanish influenza plague will be easily controlled. After the English-Indian war, a new disease, against which medical science will be helpless, will devastate Europe, especially Russia.
This disease will first cause one to go blind and then insane.
The third epidemic will follow the Spanish-French war—a lung disease—which will wipe out one-fourth of the world's population. France's entire younger generation will die.

A BUSY FAIR
MOSCOW, April 5.—Business amounting to 26,000,000,000,000 rubles of the 1922 issue was done during the first two hours of the fair recently opened at Kiev.
some questions regarding their share of the treasure found in the tomb which is estimated to be worth from \$4,000,000 to \$30,000,000.
The concession to explore this tomb was granted to Lord Carnarvon but there are some American interests involved.
The London News, which is the best authority, sent photographers to meet Lord Carnarvon on his return and they met him in France, where many photographs were obtained of treasures taken from the tomb.
Lord Carnarvon said that when they beheld the treasures by the light of the candles they were amazed by the quantity and value of the find. This tomb had not been penetrated by robbers as other tombs of kings opened had been. Candles were used as they were afraid other lights would injure the fabrics. In this chamber were two beautifully carved beds and under these beds were found 30 white wood boxes containing mummified food, legs of mutton, ducks and geese, to sustain King Tutankhamen in the future life.
Three large wreaths and funeral bouquets were found and alabaster vases of perfume whose scent could still be discerned.
The second chamber was filled five feet high with furniture, as the king had no heirs, and his furniture was all placed in the tomb, which accounts for the finding of so much treasure. The dryness of the atmosphere is the reason given for its remarkable preservation.
This paper being all the program, the club adjourned, after having thanked Mrs. Young for it.
