Small Crowd Listens to Able Speakers Tell of City's Need

The Torrance Chamber of Commerce Forum meeting held in the American Legion hall Monday night, while not largely attended, was enjoyed very much by those attending in listening to the able speakers called upon by Chairman F. L. Bennett.

The meeting was started rather late with Chairman Bennett in the chair and Secretary Gadeky in his accustomed place. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved and after the reading of correspondence from corporations in regard to locating a telegraph office in Torrance and a better telephone service, which the secretary has been trying hard to put over for several weeks, the writers promising by all that was fair to do their best in the near future to

give Torrance what it needs and wants in their lines, several speakers were called upon to expound their views on different subjects asked by Chairman Bennett.

The first speaker called upon was Carl Hyde, president of the Chamber of Commerce, of this city. He told of the good work done by the chamber during the past month and asked the co-operation of the people and that they attend the forum meetings once a month. J. C. Macdowell, the well-known real estate dealer, told of his disappointment in not being able to use a certain tract of land purchased by his firm for certain constituents for the erection of homes. This plan was frustrated when the owners decided to hold the land for oil purposes. Other speakers were called upon and talked on the subject of more homes and other things needed badly in Torrance.

Plans were also discussed as to the best way of getting a large attendance to the forum meetings and the one most favored was the serving of a well prepared luncheon at all meetings hereafter.

It is the hope of both Chairman Bennett and Secretary Gadeky that the good people of Torrance will set aside one night a month for the forum meeting and asked the Herald representative to feature a front page notice when the next meeting will be held.



### "Shanghaied" in Shanghai, Airedale Mascot of Liner Does Come Back

SEATTLE, Wash., April 5.—You can't keep a good man down, runs the old adage; nor, according to Dr. J. Edward Stroubert, surgeon of the Admiral Oriental liner President Grant, can you keep an Airedale dog away from his master. Dr. Stroubert claims, with other authorities on dogdom, that the Airedale is a one man animal, and that no matter how far away one may be taken from his master that he will make every effort to return, and generally succeeds.

In proof of this contention, the surgeon points with pride to his pet Airedale, "Paddy," who enjoys the distinction of having been "shanghaied" in Shanghai, kept captive for weeks, and of escaping and returning to the surgeon aboard the President Grant.

"Paddy," who has been owned by the surgeon since his early puppyhood, recently completed his eighth trip from Seattle to Shanghai on the President Grant. While the President Grant was docked in

Shanghai the Airedale was stolen. The entire time the Admiral Oriental liner lay in port the surgeon and other officers of the vessel spent all their available time searching for Paddy, but without success. The President Grant sailed for Seattle without Paddy, and with Dr. Stroubert grieving the loss of his pet.

That the dog must have been kept tied up while the search for it was on, was believed by the surgeon, who knew, that if free, the astute animal would speedily have found his way back to the ship. When the President Grant arrived at Seattle, friends offered other dogs to the surgeon, but he refused them, feeling that no other pet could take Paddy's place, and fostering the hope that he might yet find the latter in the Chinese port.
