30 Days' Free Training In July

California young men who want thirty days of free training at Citizens' Military Training Camps this year must send in their applications within the next ten days to be sure of acceptance.

This is the announcement just made by Colonel E. V. Smith, chief of staff, Ninety-first Division, U. S. Army, Presidio of San Francisco. Young men who have been hesitating about applying, must act at once, he says, or they will be disappointed.

Twelve counties in California have already exceeded their quotas, but young men from these counties will be accepted for a few days longer, taking the places not filled in other parts of the state, less prompt to respond. Counties that have gone over the top already are: San Diego, Sacramento, Glenn, Napa, Trinity, Nevada, Calaveras, Siskiyou, San Luis Obispo, Merced, Yuba and Modoc. These are the banner counties of the state.

Every other county in the state has students already enrolled for the camps at Del Monte and Fort Winfield Scott, except Lake, Mono, San Benito, Madera, Amador, Alpine, Sierra, Mariposa, Plumas, Kings and Del Norte. Young men between the ages of seventeen and twenty-four years are almost sure to be disappointed unless they send in their applications within the next ten days. Military authorities want every county in California to be represented and are holding vacancies in the counties named for a few days more. The camps which open July 26, offer a month's vacation, sport and amusement free to all who attend.
