FIFTY LEGION
POSTS BOOST
CLUB HOUSES

Property of Veterans in
State Is Worth
\$750,000

Over 50 American Legion posts
in California have erected club
houses and community centers. The
real estate values of same is esti-
mated at \$750,000. This is evi-
denced in movements of the for-
mer soldiers in the extension of
aims and offices for community
progress. When a hotel project is
to be given impetus, where there
is need for a city playground, or
any move for civic betterment, Le-
gion men can be found in the front
ranks of workers. A recent instance
of this is the building of a com-
munity recreational center in Cal-
exie at a cost of \$30,000. The
project was successfully carried
through by the veterans of the
community.

Promote Joint Building

Another instance is the promo-
tion of a building for the Cham-
ber of Commerce in Long Beach
which is jointly used by the Le-
gion and the Chamber of Commerce.
In 1921 the Legion men laid out
a community park in South Pasade-
na, known as Legion Park. By
co-operation of post members and
citizens of Healdsburg they erected
a \$35,000 club house around
which the social activities of the
town are centered.

The Alhambra post of the Amer-
ican Legion in Los Angeles county
has announced that a \$16,000 unit
of a Legion home will soon be
constructed, later to become an in-
tegral part of perhaps a \$60,000
project.
