MOOSE LODGE DRAWS MANY IN DISTRICT

District Deputy Hall Reports Good Progress Here.

District Deputy George R. Hall, who is starting a lodge of the Loyal Order of Moose for Torrance, Lomita and Gardena, reports that a great many replies were received in answer to the advertisement in the Torrance Herald, and many have already signed up as charter members of the Torrance lodge of Moose.

An editorial appearing in a contemporary tells something of the Mooseheart idea. It is as follows: "In the hobby of a United States cabinet officer, Secretary of Labor Davis, lies the possibility of a new standard of education that may revolutionize the present systems of teaching in American schools.

"The hobby is Mooseheart, a village established by the Loyal Order of Moose 35 miles west of Chicago. There, on a farm of 1023 acres of the most fertile land in Illinois, more than 1000 children and many mothers—all dependents of deceased members of the order—are happily located in model home groups forming a village of 50 modern fireproof buildings, with schools, churches, hospital, and water, heating and lighting systems.

"There Secretary Davis, as director general of the order, has established a system of vocational education based on the fundamental idea that, first of all, boys and girls should be trained to honest toil.

"In an interview in McClure's Magazine for November Secretary Davis explains that the Mooseheart vocational school system is founded on the principle that 'the first law of civilized life is labor' and that 'labor is the giver of all good things.'

"We teach 27 different ways of making a living," he says. "Each boy or girl will graduate with at least two or three of these methods well mastered. One of Mooseheart's earliest graduates, at the age of 18, not only made a high record in his academic studies but also mastered the trades of cook, pastry cook, nurseryman, cement modeler, cornetist, saxophone player, and landscape gardener. He was brilliant in all these lines, and capable of making a living in any one of them. And if all these trades should fail he could still fall back upon his training as a scientific farmer and could bring a living from the soil.

"How many graduates from our average city high schools could boast of such an equipment for life?"

"A very interesting part of 'The Iron Puddler,' Secretary Davis' book—which is well worth reading, by the way—is his story of the establishment of Mooseheart, and his outline of its purpose and work. He induced his fellow Welshman, Lloyd George, to visit it, and undoubtedly the war premier of Great Britain was much impressed by what he saw there."






