FORT WORTH.—Weighing three-quarters of a pound at birth, a girl baby, born to Mr. and Mrs. M. R. Watson of this city, will probably live, according to attending physicians. The small infant was one of twins. The other baby, a boy, died a few hours after birth and weighed one and one-half pounds.

Two days after birth the infant's "meal" consisted of 40 drops of water and 25 drops of milk, and her weight increased to one pound and two ounces. After the second day of life the "ration" of food was increased one drop every meal.

The mite, measuring only 10 1/2 inches from the top of her head to the soles of her inch-long feet, was moved after the second day from a cocoon of cotton in the electrically heated incubator for an olive oil bath.

DODGE CITY.—Two little girls, aged 8 and 6, modern Dallahs, it might be said, did some pretty slick work here the other day.

The mother of the little girls was taking an afternoon nap, while the children were playing in the next room. About 4 o'clock the lady woke up and, taking hold of the ends of her hair, started to coil it.
