WIFE SAVERS

Do you realize what pillows—Sofa pillows—can do to beautify your home? Not cushions stiff with embroidery or lace, or cushions of such delicate colors and material that they cannot be used. But pillows of sufficient beauty to be ornamental and yet they may be leaned against or sat upon without harm to them. Pillows rank with lighted hearths, books, lamps, flowers, pictures and mirrors in vitalizing a room and making it livable. From the standpoint of the color scheme there are infinite possibilities in the pillows. If of a bright hue the pillows may be just the touch of color needed to lighten a sombre corner, or one of dull color or black may be used to tone down a too glaring shade. Placed here and there in apparent carelessness but really with "malice aforethought," the pillow may add just the touch needed to transform a somewhat stiff room into one that is homelike.

Lemon Sauce.—Mix three-quarters cup of sugar and one tablespoon cornstarch, one-eighth tablespoon salt, slowly add one and one-half cups boiling water. Let it come to a boil, remove from the fire, add two tablespoons of butter and the grated rind and juice of one lemon.

The United States department of agriculture gives the following directions for making an oiled mop: Old stockings or any discarded woolen or flannel material may be used.

The material is cut into one-inch-wide strips, which are sewed across the middle to a foundation of heavy cloth. This is fastened to an old broom handle or used in a clamp mop handle.

The mop, when finished, may be oiled in the same way the oiled ones are renewed, by pouring

a few drops of any good floor oil into an old dish or tin box and setting the mop in this for a day or two; or the mop may be sprinkled with a little oil and allowed to stand until the oil spreads through the strings. Mops may be washed in hot suds and rinsed in clear hot water; they should be quickly dried.

Date Pie.—Take one package of dates, stoned and cut up, one cup water, juice of one lemon, one-quarter cup sugar, one tablespoon butter, pinch of salt, one cup of chopped walnut meats. Bake pie crust first. Put above ingredients on to simmer for 20 minutes. Fold in beaten whites of two eggs. Pour into shell and set in slow oven 15 minutes. Serve with whipped cream. This is a delicious pie, but rich, so never plan to serve it with a heavy meal.

For washing silks the water should not be too hot—about 110 degrees Fahrenheit; lower if the garments are colored.

Do not use salt to set color until lower temperature of water has been tried. Use no strong soaps or alkalis. Use no friction in washing. Do not use an iron that is too hot. Protect the garments with a layer of cheesecloth.

Date Corn Muffins.—Take three-quarters cup of flour, one and one-quarter cups cornmeal, one teaspoon salt, four level teaspoons of baking powder, sifted together. Add one teaspoon of molasses, two tablespoons of shortening, one egg, one-half cup of chopped dates and one and one-quarter cups of sweet milk. Beat well and pour in hot, greased muffin pans.
